Mr Semenya, are you leading the  6 next witness?  7 MR SEMENYA SC: With the leave of the  8 Chair and Commissioners, yes.  9 CHAIRPERSON: Leave granted.  10 MR SEMENYA SC: Chair, can we have  11 Colonel Scott stand up and take an oath?  12 CHAIRPERSON: Duncan George Scott.  13 CHAIRPERSON: If you could use that -  14 what are your full names, Duncan. Are you prepared to take  15 the oath, will that be binding on your conscience -  16 MR SEMENYA SC: Maybe if Mr Scott could  17 have his mike on.  18 CHAIRPERSON: Shall we start again?  19 Record your full names.  20 COLONEL SCOTT: Duncan George Scott, sir.  21 CHAIRPERSON: If I ask you to take an  22 oath will that be binding on your conscience?  23 COLONEL SCOTT: That would be, sir.  24 CHAIRPERSON: Do you swear that the  25 evidence you will give before this Commission will be the</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13328</p> <p>1 identify each document -  2 CHAIRPERSON: Yes, yes, I see.  3 MR SEMENYA SC: About that document which  4 is FFF18, it's an exhibit already, it was commissioned on  5 the 18th of October 2012, is that right?  6 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  7 MR SEMENYA SC: Your signature on the  8 page before last appears with a date on top being the 4th of  9 September 2012, do you see that?  10 COLONEL SCOTT: That is correct, yes.  11 MR SEMENYA SC: Are you able to explain  12 that?  13 COLONEL SCOTT: This statement was  14 completed on that date by the 4th of September and it was  15 commissioned in Rustenburg with a pretty lady at the  16 advocates' offices there on the 18th of October.  17 MR SEMENYA SC: Okay. The next document  18 you will find in the bundle of documents you have is marked  19 GGG39, do you see that?  20 COLONEL SCOTT: I see it.  21 MR SEMENYA SC: That too is a document  22 you, an affidavit you deposed to in November 2012, is that  23 right?  24 CHAIRPERSON: I must tell you my copy  25 isn't an affidavit because it's unsigned and unattested.</p>

Please  2 raise your right hand and say I swear, so help me God.  3 COLONEL SCOTT: I swear so to God.  4 CHAIRPERSON: Please be seated. Yes, Mr  5 Semenya?  6 DUNCAN GEORGE SCOTT: d.s.s.  7 EXAMINATION BY MR SEMENYA: Colonel, with  8 the permission of the Chair, I will be putting leading  9 questions to you, except in areas where the answers to  10 those questions are not in a written form in any of the  11 documents that you are going to deal with, okay. You have  12 before you a set of documents, one of which is marked  13 FFF18. Do you see that document?  14 COLONEL SCOTT: I've got it.  15 MR SEMENYA SC: That document is the  16 first of the statements you made with regard to the  17 Marikana matter, is that right?  18 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  19 CHAIRPERSON: I'm sorry to interrupt you,  20 Mr Semenya, I see this bundle we've been given, for which I  21 wish to thank you, contains FFF18, GGG39, HHH20 and then it  22 looks like an extra statement, which isn't an exhibit yet,  23 by Colonel Visser. Should we not give it an exhibit letter  24 now so that -  25 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, I'm just trying to</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13329</p> <p>1 MR SEMENYA SC: Alright, we'll get -  2 CHAIRPERSON: He can solve the problem by  3 confirming under oath that the contents are correct. As a  4 fact, as a fact our one isn't signed or attested.  5 MR SEMENYA SC: Okay. Barring any  6 typographical errors that may appear in that statement, is  7 that your statement?  8 COLONEL SCOTT: It is my statement.  9 MR SEMENYA SC: And do you confirm its  10 contents to be true?  11 COLONEL SCOTT: There's only one small  12 discrepancy I find in paragraph 2.  13 MR SEMENYA SC: Well, we'll get to those,  14 yes.  15 COLONEL SCOTT: Okay.  16 MR SEMENYA SC: Barring those, this is a  17 true account of facts that fell within your knowledge, is  18 that right?  19 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, that's correct.  20 MR SEMENYA SC: The other document that  21 then follows is a document marked HHH20, do you have that  22 in front of you?  23 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.  24 CHAIRPERSON: Sorry, let me correct what  25 I said to you earlier. We have a copy of GGG39 which is</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13330</p> <p>1 duly signed and attested on the 19th of November and then 2 behind it we have what looks like a copy of the same 3 document, I haven't compared the two but that's the one I 4 looked at the end of and that is undated and unsigned but 5 it's the same document, obviously it was just inserted in 6 the file by mistake. So if that's correct then we have a 7 duly signed and attested GGG39.</p> <p>8 MR SEMENYA SC: I'm grateful to you, 9 Chair. The document now, Colonel, that you're dealing with 10 is marked HHH20. Do you have that?</p> <p>11 COLONEL SCOTT: yes.</p> <p>12 MR SEMENYA SC: It too has in the 13 tramlines written on it, "Consolidated statement of Duncan 14 Scott."</p> <p>15 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.</p> <p>16 MR SEMENYA SC: That document bears your 17 signature on page 148 of 150, is that right?</p> <p>18 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.</p> <p>19 MR SEMENYA SC: And dated the 10th July 20 2013.</p> <p>21 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.</p> <p>22 MR SEMENYA SC: The other document you 23 have has no exhibit number but it is a further statement –</p> <p>24 CHAIRPERSON: I'm sorry, Mr Semenya, that 25 one hasn't got an attestation certificate. It's signed on</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13332</p> <p>1 CHAIRPERSON: Oh sorry, you're quite 2 right. JJJ1 and JJJ2. Perhaps I should just – well, 3 perhaps you can describe them for me, Mr Semenya.</p> <p>4 MR SEMENYA SC: These documents, Chair, 5 appear as item number 5 on the list of documents my learned 6 colleague Chaskalson will be dealing with. They will be 7 item 5 on that list.</p> <p>8 CHAIRPERSON: Yes, the first appears to 9 be a digital image dated the 1st, dated the 25th of January 10 2013 appearing on the Google Earth site and the second one 11 is also a Google image of the same date. I don't know 12 whether we can describe them in any greater detail than 13 that. The one seems to be a different –</p> <p>14 MR SEMENYA SC: If we can use the 15 elevation that appears there, Chair.</p> <p>16 CHAIRPERSON: Yes.</p> <p>17 MR SEMENYA SC: The one would be 1149, 18 the other one will be 1145.</p> <p>19 CHAIRPERSON: Yes. JJJ1 is the elevation 20 1145 metres and JJJ2 is the elevation 1114 – sorry, 1149 21 metres.</p> <p>22 MR SEMENYA SC: Thank you. The next 23 document, Colonel, you have before you is a statement of 24 Colonel Visser.</p> <p>25 CHAIRPERSON: Shall we make that JJJ3?</p>

Now perhaps the 2 attestation certificate should be there.</p> <p>3 MR SEMENYA SC: The attestation is not – 4 do you confirm HHH to be your consolidated statement of the 5 events in Marikana?</p> <p>6 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, I do.</p> <p>7 MR SEMENYA SC: Barring again typos, it 8 is a true account of the facts as you know them?</p> <p>9 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.</p> <p>10 CHAIRPERSON: He – ja, that's alright.</p> <p>11 And then there are two, what appear to be two annexures 12 which are, look like Google photographs and then we have 13 Colonel Visser.</p> <p>14 MR SEMENYA SC: Well, yes, yes, Chair. 15 The two Google maps, we will refer to them in the course of 16 your evidence but may we have them marked the next exhibit, 17 Chair?</p> <p>18 CHAIRPERSON: Well, I think we can now 19 move on to J, can we? H was the letter which was reserved 20 for General Mpembe so these will be J1 and 2. Sorry, what 21 I said wasn't recorded. For Colonel Scott we could use the 22 letter J. So these two documents can be J1 and J2.</p> <p>23 MR SEMENYA SC: I'm indebted to you, 24 Chair.</p> <p>25 MS PILLAY: Chair, it would be JJJ.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13333</p> <p>1 MR SEMENYA SC: Indeed, Chair. That will 2 be marked JJJ3. The last document before you is a 3 confirmatory affidavit relevant to JJJ3 which is your 4 confirmatory affidavit of contents contained in JJJ3. Do 5 you have that?</p> <p>6 COLONEL SCOTT: I don't have that before 7 me but I know I've signed that.</p> <p>8 CHAIRPERSON: I see there's a one page 9 document at the end of the file which would then be – shall 10 we make it JJJ3.1 and JJJ3.2.</p> <p>11 MR SEMENYA SC: Indeed, Chair.</p> <p>12 CHAIRPERSON: So the main affidavit which 13 is the 30 page affidavit, is JJJ3.1 and the one page 14 affidavit – that is, that's dated the 3rd September – and 15 the one page affidavit which is by this witness, which will 16 be JJJ3.2, that's an affidavit deposed to by the witness on 17 the 4th of September and that's JJJ3.2.</p> <p>18 MR SEMENYA SC: Thank you. Colonel, can 19 I then ask you to go back to your supplementary statement –</p> <p>20 COMMISSIONER HEMRAJ: Mr Semenya, this is 21 a further statement of Colonel Visser. You're not putting 22 the first statement in?</p> <p>23 MR SEMENYA SC: Madam Commissioner –</p> <p>24 COMMISSIONER HEMRAJ: JJJ3.1 says 25 "Further statement." Is there one that precedes this that</p>

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1 you'd want us to apply our minds to, or not?

2 CHAIRPERSON: In fact in paragraph 2 of

3 JJJ3.1 there's a reference to two earlier affidavits made

4 by Colonel Visser, one on the 16th of May 2013 and the other

5 on the 30th of July. I don't know whether you're going to

6 put them in or not but –

7 MR SEMENYA SC: No, Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON: - they are referred to

9 here.

10 MR SEMENYA SC: The only relevance of

11 Colonel Visser's further affidavit which appears here,

12 merely deals with the compilation of what we call exhibit L

13 to which this witness was a co-author. The other two

14 statements are not relevant to him.

15 CHAIRPERSON: I see, thank you.

16 MR SEMENYA SC: The consolidated

17 statement HHH20, can I invite you to go to that document?

18 Do you have it?

19 COLONEL SCOTT: I'm there.

20 MR SEMENYA SC: Just so that we

21 understand the context of the various affidavits you

22 deposed to, can I draw your attention to paragraph 52.20

23 appearing on page 147 of 149. Are you there?

24 COLONEL SCOTT: I'm there.

25 MR SEMENYA SC: Can you read out what you

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1 say to us there?

2 COLONEL SCOTT: It reads as follows, "My

3 statement provides my experience of the days at Marikana to

4 the best of my recollection. I cannot account for all my

5 time spent at Marikana or every conversation or incident,

6 but I've spent much time reflecting on the days and

7 recalling the events, conversations and thoughts which

8 formed my decisions and suggestions over the days. What I

9 have portrayed in my statement is what I can account for.

10 I say this, "understanding I have much time in dealing with

11 the police's presentation and realising that hindsight is a

12 danger which I have consciously tried to avoid in

13 preparation of this statement."

14 MR SEMENYA SC: Okay. Colonel, can we

15 now go back to deal with section B. You will find that

16 appearing on page 2 of the statement HHH20. Are you there?

17 COLONEL SCOTT: I'm there.

18 MR SEMENYA SC: There under section 1 of

19 B you deal with your career experience, is that right?

20 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

21 MR SEMENYA SC: With you matriculating in

22 1986 at Randfontein High School and being drafted in the

23 national service in '87 and '88, is that right?

24 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

25 MR SEMENYA SC: You complete your

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1 training in the STF selection course 14 in 1993.

2 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

3 CHAIRPERSON: May I enquire whether

4 copies of this statement from which you are now leading

5 have been made available to the media? Obviously you're

6 going to deal with the highlights now but you may well

7 think it important that the media should have the complete

8 copy so that they can report extra bits that are not dealt

9 with in your highlighted section if they consider it

10 relevant.

11 MR SEMENYA SC: I'll make sure that

12 happens, Chair. As you say, you were one of the 16 who

13 succeeded in that course of a group of 310 candidates that

14 were there, is that right?

15 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

16 MR SEMENYA SC: This was in 1993.

17 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.

18 MR SEMENYA SC: And you completed the

19 mandatory advanced courses and you were deployed

20 operationally over two years in 1995 as well, is that

21 right?

22 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

23 MR SEMENYA SC: And it was early in your

24 STF career that you, the unit management earmarked you as a

25 potential training instructor, is that right?

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1 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

2 MR SEMENYA SC: By 1996 you trained as an

3 instructor for STF and in 1998 you were appointed STF urban

4 phase leader, is that right?

5 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

6 MR SEMENYA SC: What does that entail?

7 COLONEL SCOTT: A phase leader is

8 somebody that becomes a field leader that takes, in this

9 case, the urban field forward, is in control of that field

10 within the STF environment and has to manage the

11 instruction and the training given in that field.

12 MR SEMENYA SC: And what did you have to

13 do with the methodologies adopted by the urban phase

14 leaders?

15 COLONEL SCOTT: At the time that I took

16 it over I had started cross-training with sister units

17 internationally as well as nationally and I had taken best

18 practices and started enhancing and applying new strategies

19 in training, which eventually were becoming adopted by our

20 division training as best practices.

21 MR SEMENYA SC: And it was in 2007 that

22 you were tasked to be the STF section head, is that right?

23 COLONEL SCOTT: No.

24 MR SEMENYA SC: What are you saying to us

25 against paragraph 5.4?

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13338</p> <p>1 COLONEL SCOTT: I was tasked in 2007 to 2 represent the unit at a planning of an inter-departmental 3 operation . 4 MR SEMENYA SC: And that was code-named 5 Air Wolf. 6 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right. 7 MR SEMENYA SC: What did you do there? 8 COLONEL SCOTT: It was a dual operation 9 and I was in charge of the planning thereof, the organising 10 and the deploying of the forces in that operation. It was 11 in preparation for the football World Cup as well as to 12 combat certain crime taking place on the borderline of 13 South Africa. 14 MR SEMENYA SC: And against paragraph 5.5 15 you tell us what happened on the completion of the 16 operation Air Wolf and what instructions you got from the 17 Deputy National Commissioner Pruis, is that right? 18 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 19 MR SEMENYA SC: You also deal with things 20 that you did relevant to the 2010 FIFA World Cup that was 21 hosted in this country, is that right? 22 COLONEL SCOTT: That is correct. 23 MR SEMENYA SC: Against paragraph 5.6 you 24 tell us the responsibilities you had in 2007, is that 25 right?</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13340</p> <p>1 MR SEMENYA SC: Your leadership positions 2 you held are also dealt with in paragraph 5.10 going 3 forward, is that right? 4 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 5 MR SEMENYA SC: That's where you tell us 6 you played a leading role in planning, organising and co- 7 ordinating multi-disciplinary operations where high risk 8 units were integrated, is that right? 9 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 10 MR SEMENYA SC: You also tell us about 11 Operation Air Wolf to which you made earlier reference, is 12 that right? 13 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 14 MR SEMENYA SC: And under paragraph 15 5.10.3 you deal with various roles that you occupied and 16 painted it Greenpoint operational shield 1, operation 17 shield 2 and operation shield 3. 18 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 19 [10:04] MR SEMENYA SC: So too, you deal with the 20 matters of the FIFA World Cup again. Under that paragraph 21 you also include in it Operation Squeeze, the criminals 22 that happened in Soshanguve, Pretoria, is that right? 23 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 24 MR SEMENYA SC: You also deal in the line 25 of your experience with what happened with the African</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13339</p> <p>1 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 2 MR SEMENYA SC: And at that point you 3 held various things, both as a Colonel, later as Brigadier, 4 up until you are the full Colonel you are today, is that 5 right? 6 COLONEL SCOTT: No, I was a Lieutenant- 7 Colonel and I completed the job description of the vacant 8 post of the Colonel and was promoted, after time, into that 9 position. 10 MR SEMENYA SC: Oh yes, thank you. Your 11 policing experience you describe against paragraph 5.9 and 12 page 6 of that document, is that right? 13 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 14 MR SEMENYA SC: You had a year and eight 15 months policing experience in Maritzburg SAP Community 16 Service Centre, is that right? 17 COLONEL SCOTT: Are we at paragraph 18 5.9.1? Yes, one year and eight months. 19 MR SEMENYA SC: And some three months' 20 experience in the public order policing based at unit 2, 21 Diepkloof, is that right? 22 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 23 MR SEMENYA SC: And 20 years' experience, 24 operational experience in the special task force? 25 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13341</p> <p>1 Union Summit that was in Equatorial Guinea. 2 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 3 MR SEMENYA SC: You deal also too in your 4 course of experience with the conference of parties that 5 was Cops 17, held in Durban. 6 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right. 7 MR SEMENYA SC: In your experience, 8 Colonel, you have undergone various training as an STF 9 urban instructor for 14 courses during the period 96 to 10 2009, is that right? 11 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right. 12 MR SEMENYA SC: As an STF urban based 13 leader to which you testified earlier, you did 12 courses 14 there during 1998 and 2009. 15 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 16 MR SEMENYA SC: - instructor 2004 to 17 2009. 18 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 19 MR SEMENYA SC: STF weapon face leader 20 for one course, right? 21 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right. 22 MR SEMENYA SC: And you cite various 23 other training that you received during the course of your 24 career, is that right? 25 COLONEL SCOTT: That I've presented, yes.</p>

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1 MR SEMENYA SC: You have also – you also  
 2 deal against paragraph 5.12 with various initiatives to  
 3 introduce systems aimed at streamlining problematic areas.  
 4 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 5 MR SEMENYA SC: Those you table quite at  
 6 some length throughout page 9 to 10, as well as the top of  
 7 page 11, is that right?  
 8 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 9 MR SEMENYA SC: Your qualifications are  
 10 that of a matric as you told us in 1986, your national  
 11 diploma in policing that you got cum laude in 1997, am I  
 12 right?  
 13 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 14 MR SEMENYA SC: Then you have the BTech  
 15 degree in policing which you did at Pretoria Technikon in  
 16 2003.  
 17 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 18 MR SEMENYA SC: You enumerate a whole  
 19 number of courses that you did over the period of your  
 20 career with the South African Police Service. Those you  
 21 tabulate against paragraph 5.13.2. Is that right?  
 22 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 23 MR SEMENYA SC: And we may mention that  
 24 in relation to the operational commanders training, the OCT  
 25 in 2002, following the recommendation of the Goldstone

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1 Commission, you came out as a best student when dealing  
 2 with the focus on training, which was to re-orientate the  
 3 police service in the proper public order policing.  
 4 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. If I can  
 5 just make mention to 5.13.2, the second bullet, internal  
 6 stability course 1992, the course is a dual course, dealing  
 7 with internal stability and combined POP training. It was  
 8 not a complete six weeks POP training. There were two  
 9 weeks dedicated to POP training in that course.  
 10 MR SEMENYA SC: Just in summary, what did  
 11 that entail, that POP training?  
 12 COLONEL SCOTT: That POP training was at  
 13 the basic level of the front man on the ground, and it had  
 14 to deal with the tactical options employed by POPs, the  
 15 formations.  
 16 CHAIRPERSON: So, do we change this  
 17 bullet to read, "internal stability course 1992, a six week  
 18 course (two weeks POP)?"  
 19 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right.  
 20 MR SEMENYA SC: And the one bullet before  
 21 last, that deals specifically with hostage negotiators  
 22 course, is that right?  
 23 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 24 MR SEMENYA SC: What did that entail?  
 25 COLONEL SCOTT: So this entails

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1 addressing conflictive situations where the police are  
 2 called in and you need to resolve it through dialogue,  
 3 that's the short nutshell of it.  
 4 MR SEMENYA SC: Okay. The next page, at  
 5 13 you deal with the external local providers, you deal  
 6 with those in quite some detail, is that right?  
 7 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 8 MR SEMENYA SC: And on page 14, you deal  
 9 with various commendations and awards you have received in  
 10 the course of your career.  
 11 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 12 MR SEMENYA SC: But may we make special  
 13 mention of the third bullet on the top of page 14, you tell  
 14 us you were in the USA and what was happening there?  
 15 COLONEL SCOTT: The protective  
 16 intelligence investigation course.  
 17 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes.  
 18 COLONEL SCOTT: That was a course that  
 19 was presented in South Africa by a United States  
 20 delegation, and that deals with the gaining of  
 21 intelligence, the analysing of intelligence and then the  
 22 acting upon that intelligence, or the verifying of it, to  
 23 give it over to the operational side to act upon.  
 24 MR SEMENYA SC: And the next bullet?  
 25 COLONEL SCOTT: The next bullet is the

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1 tactical commanders course which is the training of leaders  
 2 over the crisis response teams which was a course on page  
 3 13, last bullet where we see the USA crisis response team  
 4 training. The course in 2001 included one week of team  
 5 leader training. The United States later developed its own  
 6 course in team leader, which we see as the fourth bullet on  
 7 14, page 14, which it was dedicated to training the leaders  
 8 over the operational members on the ground.  
 9 MR SEMENYA SC: So that is where you  
 10 train the commanders.  
 11 COLONEL SCOTT: This is not the - a South  
 12 African course, this was just a course we attended with the  
 13 United States, yes.  
 14 MR SEMENYA SC: For the commanders?  
 15 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.  
 16 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, there are various  
 17 commendations you have received over the period, both  
 18 academic and others which you received in the special task  
 19 force, is that right?  
 20 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 21 MR SEMENYA SC: Those are dealt with on  
 22 page 15 of your statement.  
 23 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 24 MR SEMENYA SC: There are milestones you  
 25 point out that appear on page 16 of your statement, am I

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1 right?

2 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right.

3 MR SEMENYA SC: Section C now begins to

4 deal with the events at Marikana, can we get to those?

5 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.

6 MR SEMENYA SC: "On Monday, the 13th, you

7 tell us that you received a phone call from Brigadier

8 Fritz, that is 13th of August 2012, is that right?

9 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

10 MR SEMENYA SC: What does Brigadier Fritz

11 say to you?

12 COLONEL SCOTT: Brigadier Fritz basically

13 told me that there was an incident at Marikana, that I

14 needed to report there. General Annandale was awaiting me.

15 I needed to assist in the planning and co-ordination of an

16 operation in apprehending suspects that had attacked police

17 members that day.

18 MR SEMENYA SC: And who is Brigadier

19 Fritz?

20 COLONEL SCOTT: Brigadier Fritz is the,

21 at that time he was the section head of the special task

22 force, that's the commander, overall commander of the

23 special task force.

24 MR SEMENYA SC: That is the commander

25 under whom you –

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1 COLONEL SCOTT: Under whom I report

2 directly to, yes.

3 MR SEMENYA SC: Right. So the

4 information from Brigadier Fritz is that you should go to

5 Marikana, report to Major-General Annandale, do you do

6 that?

7 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.

8 MR SEMENYA SC: Does he give you some

9 information why you should be going there?

10 COLONEL SCOTT: Brigadier Fritz or?

11 MR SEMENYA SC: That is Brigadier Fritz.

12 COLONEL SCOTT: At that time, he

13 mentioned that policemen had been killed in an incident in

14 Marikana. The information was very minimal and that we

15 were required as the special task force to go and assist in

16 apprehending the suspects who had escaped from the police

17 thereafter.

18 MR SEMENYA SC: What were the facts told

19 to you about that around the killing of the policemen as

20 you say?

21 COLONEL SCOTT: At that stage, it was

22 very, there wasn't much. I had just been told that

23 policemen had been hacked and had died, so that there were

24 pangas and that type of dangerous weapon involved.

25 MR SEMENYA SC: And you tell us against

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1 paragraph 6.2 that at that time, you were not aware of the

2 ongoing strike action at Lonmin Mine?

3 COLONEL SCOTT: No, I wasn't.

4 MR SEMENYA SC: And you thought this to

5 be just one of the STF operations about which Brigadier

6 Fritz was talking to you about?

7 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. He had

8 mentioned that the suspects had run to a mountain and my

9 understanding at that time, it was the Magaliesburg

10 Mountains, interpreting the mountain as a true mountain in

11 the English sense, and that we had to conduct a follow up

12 operation to track literally the spoor of the perpetrators

13 and attempt to arrest them.

14 MR SEMENYA SC: And on your way to

15 Marikana you called Major-General Annandale, did you not?

16 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right.

17 MR SEMENYA SC: What did you say to him?

18 COLONEL SCOTT: I mentioned to him that

19 we were en route and he assisted me with directions to get

20 to the JOC area at the Lonmin Mine.

21 MR SEMENYA SC: Okay. And you say on

22 your way there, what did you do while travelling to

23 Pretoria?

24 COLONEL SCOTT: En route, as is customary

25 with a call out responsive operation, we would start with

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1 the appreciation process immediately and start formulating

2 strategy, understanding that time is of essence and one

3 needs to hit the ground running sometimes. So you wouldn't

4 wait necessarily until you get to the scene, but you'd

5 start with your planning procedure already en route.

6 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, and as you earlier

7 say, from the information you received Brigadier Fritz, you

8 really thought that the mountain he is referring to was the

9 Magaliesburg Mountain.

10 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

11 MR SEMENYA SC: And you thought the group

12 of people after whom you had to track, would be a group of

13 how many more or less?

14 COLONEL SCOTT: I estimated about ten,

15 being told that it was two policemen that had at that time

16 died. That was about the size of the group at most that I

17 thought we would have to pursue and attempt to arrest.

18 MR SEMENYA SC: And you tell us that at

19 that time you were beginning to conceptualise an operation

20 deployment of various units.

21 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

22 MR SEMENYA SC: In your mind, at that

23 time, as your statement says, you had had in mind an STF

24 led operation with the assistance of the NIU, the TRT and

25 POP.

It was dark. We looked firstly on  4 the mine maps and then I took him to a Google map, and we  5 plotted specifically where we were, plotted where he said  6 that the miners had been coming together, or the strikers.  7 He showed me as well where, and explained to me at that  8 time that there had been two fatalities on the Sunday with  9 the mine security. It's difficult at this time 20 as well, with the limited information and not relying now 21 on hindsight but at that time the group of 3 000 was seen 22 as being the striking group. I was not aware yet that 23 there was a militant group. But I knew that there was no 24 way that the tactical units themselves would be able to 25 move towards a group like that. We needed to first deal</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13368</p> <p>1 members would need a protective element, in essence your 2 reasoning was that if tactical units were deployed in 3 support to protect the POP members they would with 4 reassurance focus their attention of the public order 5 policing tactics. 6 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. 7 MR SEMENYA SC: Stated simply it was your 8 view that with the benefit of the tactical units being 9 present during a POP operation the POP members would do 10 their work with greater assurance? 11 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct and if 12 there were dangerous situations or arrests that needed to 13 be made of dangerous individuals that the POPs could rely 14 on the better trained tactical members beyond them to deal 15 with those situations. 16 MR SEMENYA SC: And as you said at the 17 bottom of the page, if the police needed to use the POP 18 members to resolve the situation tactically they would be 19 able to stand information with more confidence to apply any 20 defensive or offensive of tactical options required of 21 them. 22 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 23 MR SEMENYA SC: And they would do that 24 with a better knowing that they have immediate support if 25 required.</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13367</p> <p>1 with that on a public order basis and then the strategies 2 thereafter actually spoke to how to utilise the tactical 3 units. 4 MR SEMENYA SC: And your assessment of 5 the situation was that POP members would be in danger if 6 they needed to confront the strikers with a tactical 7 option, is that right? 8 COLONEL SCOTT: That was my view, yes. 9 MR SEMENYA SC: And you say because the 10 POP members highest level of offensive operations is still 11 carried out with less than lethal force thus having the POP 12 members primary weapons intended for non lethal 13 application, is that right? 14 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 15 MR SEMENYA SC: There you really are 16 saying that POP members would have, apart from their side 17 arm, they would have your teargas, they would have the stun 18 grenades, they would have water cannons and they would have 19 the ultimate offensive weapon rubber bullets? 20 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. 21 MR SEMENYA SC: Or rubber rounds in this 22 instance? 23 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. 24 MR SEMENYA SC: You continue to say to us 25 that while considering this issue you reasoned that the POP</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13369</p> <p>1 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right. 2 MR SEMENYA SC: If we may stop here for a 3 little while. The tactical units you had in mind would be? 4 COLONEL SCOTT: The, starting at the 5 lower end the Tactical Response Teams, known as the TRT, 6 the National Intervention Unit, the NIU and the Special 7 Taskforce, STF. 8 MR SEMENYA SC: And as you say you 9 reasoned that POP would need to play leading role and be 10 the first line of contact with the strikers thus the 11 operational concept would need to embrace the strategies 12 utilised in public order operations but with an added 13 element of the tactical units employed in various roles of 14 support. 15 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right. 16 MR SEMENYA SC: What supporting role did 17 you have in mind for the TRT? 18 COLONEL SCOTT: Well the TRT was there as 19 I say, if the situation became acceptably to dangerous for 20 public order policing members to deal with, that they could 21 withdraw into safe havens which I planned to be the Nyalas 22 which would permit the TRT members at that time to move 23 forward to make arrests and not have to put members with 24 non lethal force essentially in their possession into 25 harm's way.</p>

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1 MR SEMENYA SC: And for the NIU?  
 2 COLONEL SCOTT: A similar role and for  
 3 the STF a similar, that's dealing with the crowd as such at  
 4 the koppie, although there were secondary roles as well for  
 5 all those units when it came to further phases but at this  
 6 stage I wasn't thinking yet necessarily the sequential  
 7 phases although they were part of the mindset already. I  
 8 knew there would need to be high risk arrests made where  
 9 the firearms would be in possession of those that took them  
 10 from the deceased miners and police members.  
 11 MR SEMENYA SC: And you tell us that the  
 12 plan you were conceiving it would have to be one that was a  
 13 hybrid similar to plans used on other major events, is that  
 14 right?  
 15 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 16 MR SEMENYA SC: But you tell us that with  
 17 this the emphasis was also on bringing the ongoing violence  
 18 and the destruction of property to an end.  
 19 COLONEL SCOTT: Sorry, can you just  
 20 repeat that.  
 21 MR SEMENYA SC: Against paragraph 6.24  
 22 you tell us that there was also an added emphasis to this  
 23 hybrid operation that was also to try and bring to fold the  
 24 ongoing violence and the destruction to property.  
 25 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

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1 MR SEMENYA SC: And also the safety of  
 2 the police members while they carry out their duty?  
 3 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. At this time with  
 4 the limited knowledge and the limited information given one  
 5 is working on basic policing principles which are generic  
 6 throughout the police in pretty much any situation we find.  
 7 [10:44] MR SEMENYA SC: And those would be what?  
 8 COLONEL SCOTT: That any police official  
 9 arriving at any situation which is conflictive or looking  
 10 aggressive, would always use dialogue as a first resort  
 11 unless of course he is immediately challenged with a force  
 12 that he needs to respond to proportionately in order to  
 13 bring it back down, whereby he would bring his own force  
 14 level down in order to retain or to move back to the  
 15 dialogue level.  
 16 MR SEMENYA SC: Okay. And you describe  
 17 those as the use of dialogue in the first instance, is that  
 18 right?  
 19 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right.  
 20 MR SEMENYA SC: And you also say that,  
 21 "Depending on the situation, when dealing with persons who  
 22 have contravened the law and have a desire to escape or  
 23 fight, the police are to provide a show of force to help  
 24 the transgressors reason logically that they are better off  
 25 complying with the request of the police to de-escalate the

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1 threat rather than confronting the authority represented in  
 2 the show of force they are physically able to see." This  
 3 is the show of force dissuasion tactic you say you describe  
 4 that as?  
 5 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. Many  
 6 times a suspect or a perpetrator may sum up his opportunity  
 7 to take on a police official and if you can show them a  
 8 show of force or an overwhelming show of force from your  
 9 side, reason tends to return and they tend to back down  
 10 through possibly intimidation or what we like to say is we  
 11 dissuade them from action against the police.  
 12 MR SEMENYA SC: This is part of what  
 13 would later be part of your plan about the impact of police  
 14 numbers in any environment of this kind.  
 15 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.  
 16 MR SEMENYA SC: Past experience, what  
 17 would a large number of police presence cause as a reaction  
 18 to such a situation?  
 19 COLONEL SCOTT: Well, past experience  
 20 dealing in specialised environments or very high risk  
 21 environments, one has to assess your opponent again. If we  
 22 were dealing with somebody who was suicidal or possibly  
 23 somebody dealing with martyrdom in a terrorist situation,  
 24 you wouldn't want to necessarily have a show of force, but  
 25 when you're dealing with people that have a desire to live

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1 and you can see that they're not reasoning well, this is  
 2 when you could bring in a show of force to help them to  
 3 reason again and this has worked for us in the past many a  
 4 time. When my unit has arrived on scene, there are times  
 5 that the negotiators would make mention that our unit is  
 6 there and the perpetrator at that time would simply give  
 7 up, knowing that he has now either got to take the  
 8 opportunity to hand himself over or, if his desire is that  
 9 he would need to confront the unit coming in to arrest him  
 10 and many times they simply give up.  
 11 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes and you say if that  
 12 does not dissuade the crowd and a situation gets worse,  
 13 what is the next step?  
 14 COLONEL SCOTT: Well, you would need to  
 15 always have a contingency action, a standby action, a  
 16 tactical option available. We know that we're in a police  
 17 service, we work inside the country and we can't allow acts  
 18 to go – I don't want to say punished, but we need to  
 19 apprehend those that have committed certain acts because  
 20 they need to be brought through the system as is expected  
 21 of the police service.  
 22 MR SEMENYA SC: And you say there would  
 23 then, depending on the situation, be a force continuum that  
 24 is employed to meet the challenge. What is the, what are  
 25 the ranges in this continuum?

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13374</p> <p>1 COLONEL SCOTT: Even when we go tactical,  2 and I speak on behalf of the task force or any other police  3 officer, he would confront the opponent firstly with verbal  4 commands, unless of course he enters and he gets shot at or  5 he approaches and he gets shot at immediately, you would  6 need to then defend your life, for instance, but in essence  7 a police officer has got principles of going forward with  8 the force continuum. So he needs to assess the level of  9 force coming towards him and he would meet it at that same  10 level to try to de-escalate the force down to lower levels  11 and as the force de-escalates, so he de-escalates his level  12 of force, which needs to be proportionate at all times, but  13 when we come in we have the mindset of starting at verbal,  14 verbal command.</p> <p>15 MR SEMENYA SC: What would come next  16 after the verbal command?</p> <p>17 COLONEL SCOTT: If I speak on behalf of  18 our unit, we start with verbal command but we actually go  19 on - before that we would have a visual presence. So  20 normally you would see the presence of a tactical officer  21 and understand that they are well-trained, they are well-  22 equipped and that would be your opponent should you choose  23 to want confrontation. But when the members do need to  24 confront then we start with loud and aggressive verbal  25 commands to intimidate the opponent into giving up and</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13376</p> <p>1 try to get too close which is the normal force continuum  2 which you would expect of them.</p> <p>3 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes. And it was your  4 reasoning, you tell us, that POP would provide the first  5 line of policing in the initial operational strategy to  6 restore order to the area, due to the size of the crowd and  7 with the ability to apply non-lethal force to restore  8 order.</p> <p>9 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right.</p> <p>10 MR SEMENYA SC: Past experience, what  11 would happen with a large crowd of people when a verbal  12 warning is given to disperse?</p> <p>13 COLONEL SCOTT: From the observations  14 I've had, the limited experience in POPs at that time,  15 which also I did deal with, with crowds and marchers and  16 protesters but from where, sitting back in major events, et  17 cetera, when verbal warnings are issued and the police have  18 taken up a line, the crowd generally starts dispersing.  19 They understand where the police are at and they understand  20 what's possibly next to come and most times the crowd  21 simply disperses on its own or moves away to another  22 environment.</p> <p>23 MR SEMENYA SC: And during that time, as  24 you say, that logic would prevail to those who are seeking  25 no confrontation and would disperse by themselves.</p>

Moving from that, we're trained in - and  2 this is, most police officers have some degree of training  3 in unarmed combat or self-defence and from there one can  4 move to the less lethal options which even ourselves carry,  5 which are Taser weapons, pepper spray to disorientate or to  6 gain the advantage and from that one would move to multiple  7 take-downs once a member has been disorientated.</p> <p>8 MR SEMENYA SC: And in public order  9 policing environment, what would be the force continuum  10 there?</p> <p>11 COLONEL SCOTT: Well, the public order  12 one would also expect that dialogue would be given  13 beforehand, understanding that in public order you are  14 dealing with crowds and we know that not all crowds have  15 the same intention, that there could be bystanders,  16 onlookers, others with other agendas. So you give the  17 verbal instruction to allow those that don't want to be  18 part, to leave and thereafter you would start again with  19 your lowest level of force to try to get people to leave  20 and eventually escalate through the levels. And I  21 understand there are documents which do speak to the order  22 of that but in understanding Marikana and as we'll see  23 later in the statement, I chose to recommend the water  24 cannons being utilised first, the reason for that being the  25 greater standoff distance, to not have the police have to</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13377</p> <p>1 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.</p> <p>2 MR SEMENYA SC: On page 27 you tell us  3 that you remained aware that a tactical option would need  4 to be planned for as well, should that situation get there.</p> <p>5 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right.</p> <p>6 MR SEMENYA SC: And you tell us that you  7 were, however, mindful that any tactical option by POP  8 could be met with the same response as was experienced on  9 Monday the 13th.</p> <p>10 COLONEL SCOTT: That was my view at that  11 time, yes.</p> <p>12 MR SEMENYA SC: And that the - maybe a  13 confrontation that mimics what happened on that Monday.</p> <p>14 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.</p> <p>15 MR SEMENYA SC: You also tell us that the  16 rationale was based on the precept that police should only  17 move to an offensive POP tactical option if the strike has  18 escalated, a threat of violence and destruction by  19 mobilising as a group to move to a predetermined target.</p> <p>20 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right. Brigadier Calitz introduced you to 22 Lieutenant-Colonel Merafi. 23 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right. 24 MR SEMENYA SC: Who you were told and you 25 now know is a commander of the POP unit in Rustenburg.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13381</p> <p>1 it. 2 CHAIRPERSON: Sorry, you're at paragraph 3 6.30 of the statement, page 28. 4 MR SEMENYA SC: That is correct, Chair. 5 Is that right? 6 COLONEL SCOTT: That is correct. 7 MR SEMENYA SC: And then you arranged 8 with Mr Sinclair to print a large copy of a satellite photo 9 of the area where the koppie was located and you gathered 10 around the table in the JOC to discuss the options that are 11 available to the police. 12 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right. It was a 13 room just adjacent or just off the JOC room itself. 14 MR SEMENYA SC: Alright. 15 COLONEL SCOTT: Adjoining room. 16 MR SEMENYA SC: So in company you have 17 Lieutenant-Colonel Merafi, you've got Mr Sinclair and you 18 say other police officers. Who else was there? 19 COLONEL SCOTT: It's as you've said. Mr 20 Sinclair was there, he was assisting us with information 21 that we needed. Colonel Merafi who I'd been introduced to 22 and I'm not sure of the others but he had two members with 23 him that he'd brought with him. 24 MR SEMENYA SC: And you facilitated the 25 planning session.</p>

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1 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.  
 2 MR SEMENYA SC: Starting with a problem  
 3 solving process.  
 4 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.  
 5 MR SEMENYA SC: This, you say, means that  
 6 you analyse what the problem is, you identify possible  
 7 solutions, you review the concept and you decide on the co-  
 8 ordinating instructions. What does that entail?  
 9 COLONEL SCOTT: Co-ordinating  
 10 instructions are simply instructions where we would give  
 11 the operational concept structure. It's not the specific  
 12 briefing, it's just more directed towards the time line of  
 13 when we would expect to do things and in what sequence we  
 14 would expect to do those things.  
 15 MR SEMENYA SC: Like backing backwards,  
 16 if you know you're going to do an operation at this time,  
 17 what should happen before that time, et cetera.  
 18 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right. It's a  
 19 reverse time line.  
 20 MR SEMENYA SC: And you tell us that Mr  
 21 Sinclair was present during some of the planning that you  
 22 were doing, providing you with information which the  
 23 security at the time had.  
 24 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. He was actually  
 25 very helpful to us. I think without him being there we

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1 would have really struggled. He gave us, at that time as  
 2 well when we went into that planning circle, quite a bit of  
 3 information regarding who, at that stage who – I'm  
 4 presuming who he thought the strikers were, how many they  
 5 were, what their movements were.  
 6 MR SEMENYA SC: And part of the  
 7 information given to you is that some of the strikers moved  
 8 away from the koppie at night and returned in the morning.  
 9 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.  
 10 MR SEMENYA SC: But also that there was  
 11 some small part of strikers, small group, rather, of  
 12 strikers who spent the night at the koppie.  
 13 COLONEL SCOTT: That's the information  
 14 received, yes.  
 15 MR SEMENYA SC: And that in the morning  
 16 many strikers would then move through Nkaneng settlement,  
 17 back to the koppie.  
 18 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. I recall him  
 19 specifically showing me that when we went out for a later  
 20 orientation and he showed me where the Wonderkop mine  
 21 hostels were and orientated me as to the Nkaneng settlement  
 22 and then showed me what the path of the miners were, or the  
 23 strikers.  
 24 MR SEMENYA SC: With that information at  
 25 hand, you then devised what you call an opportunistic plan.

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1 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.  
 2 MR SEMENYA SC: Can you tell us what that  
 3 is?  
 4 COLONEL SCOTT: I'm not sure if at this  
 5 stage it would be good to go to the actual map so that I  
 6 can show an orientation on that map as I speak to –  
 7 CHAIRPERSON: You must do what you  
 8 consider best to enable you to convey to us what you –  
 9 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.  
 10 CHAIRPERSON: - what you what to tell us.  
 11 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. I had a similar map  
 12 and it'll come up on screen –  
 13 CHAIRPERSON: Aren't these maps already  
 14 exhibits – I'm told I turned my machine off by mistake. If  
 15 this map is already an exhibit please give us the exhibit  
 16 number. If it isn't, tell me that and then we can give it  
 17 an exhibit number and describe it for the record.  
 18 COLONEL SCOTT: Chairperson, to my  
 19 knowledge it's not. It is included in your bundles. I  
 20 think it's –  
 21 MR MAHLANGU: There's the Google maps.  
 22 COLONEL SCOTT: - to get one today.  
 23 MR SEMENYA SC: Chair, we're going to be  
 24 referring to item 5, as we described it, and it is –  
 25 CHAIRPERSON: So it'll be JJJ4 and how

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1 does one describe it? Well, you can describe it so that  
 2 people can find it. Are these the two Google maps attached  
 3 to your statement – oh, I see. We haven't – we've marked  
 4 those already. We've marked them already and we described  
 5 them by the elevations, as far as I recall. The first one  
 6 is JJJ3 point – JJJ1 is a Google Earth image, elevation  
 7 1145 metres and JJJ2 is a Google Earth image, elevation  
 8 1149 metres. Which are you referring to first?  
 9 COLONEL SCOTT: Chairperson, I'm going to  
 10 go into the actual programme itself, Google Earth. I  
 11 printed those out as hard copies obviously but in the  
 12 programme I can better show you. That's why I gave you an  
 13 aerial view as well as a closer view of the actual document  
 14 that I'll speak to now.  
 15 CHAIRPERSON: Yes.  
 16 COLONEL SCOTT: It won't go further than  
 17 that. It'll basically show you what you have as pictures  
 18 there.  
 19 CHAIRPERSON: Well, if you're going to –  
 20 Mr Chaskalson, do you want to say something?  
 21 MR CHASKALSON SC: Mr Chairperson, we  
 22 contemplated the same problem in relation to our exhibits  
 23 and I would respectfully suggest that we should give the  
 24 Google Earth file itself, the electronic file, a separate  
 25 exhibit number because one can show a great deal more on



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1 the electronic file than on the hard copies.  
 2 CHAIRPERSON: Okay, so we will have JJJ4  
 3 and that'll be – how do you describe the file? Google  
 4 Earth file, how does one describe the file?  
 5 COLONEL SCOTT: The name is  
 6 "Opsplatinum.kmz."  
 7 CHAIRPERSON: Opsplatinum.kmz. Is that  
 8 the description? Alright, so we have that exhibit then,  
 9 JJJ4, Google Earth file Opsplatinum.kmz.  
 10 COLONEL SCOTT: I know it may be brought  
 11 up later, Chairperson, and I'm not that acquainted with  
 12 all, how to check the validity of IT documents, I think, as  
 13 well as maybe the evidence leaders and their people but I  
 14 do understand that the date modified speaks to when the  
 15 file was created.  
 16 CHAIRPERSON: Alright, so you want me  
 17 then to add to the description of the exhibit, Google Earth  
 18 file Opsplatinum.kmz and in brackets, date modified  
 19 2012.08.14 05:46AM. You agree, Mr Chaskalson, that's a  
 20 necessary part of the description of the exhibit?  
 21 MR CHASKALSON SC: We do agree that it's  
 22 not necessarily a necessary part but Colonel Scott's  
 23 description of what signifies is correct, that is when it  
 24 was saved, according to the clock on his computer.  
 25 CHAIRPERSON: Well, if anyone has to read

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1 this record later, to the extent of looking at the  
 2 exhibits, we've got enough on record now by way of  
 3 description of the exhibit for the exhibit to be found  
 4 without any difficulty, which is the exercise we're busy  
 5 with. It's now already a conflict of testimony as to  
 6 whether modified means created or saved. I don't know  
 7 whether we have to resolve that dispute now but he said one  
 8 thing, you said another, Mr Chaskalson.  
 9 MR SEMENYA SC: Well, Chair, for the  
 10 purposes of the evidence-in-chief we intend to convey no  
 11 more than the fact that this document as at that date was  
 12 in existence. There may very well be some debate but at  
 13 least what is not in debate, debatable, is that the  
 14 document was in existence on Colonel Scott's computer at  
 15 that date.  
 16 CHAIRPERSON: And time, yes. Well, I  
 17 take it that's a satisfactory resolution of the difference.  
 18 Shall we proceed? We've now zoomed in on an image which we  
 19 can see which in fact is – is that the picture that you  
 20 copied for us?  
 21 COLONEL SCOTT: That's the picture you  
 22 have.  
 23 CHAIRPERSON: Or one of the pictures you  
 24 copied. Which one is it?  
 25 COLONEL SCOTT: The first picture you

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1 have would simply, would be at about, I think round about  
 2 looking something to that –  
 3 CHAIRPERSON: 45 is – JJJ1 is the  
 4 elevation 1145 metres and JJJ2 is elevation 1149. Now  
 5 those are the two that you printed out for us which are  
 6 annexed to your affidavit, so which one are we looking at  
 7 now, JJJ1 or 2?  
 8 COLONEL SCOTT: I'll speak first to the  
 9 wide angle.  
 10 MR CHASKALSON SC: Mr Chairperson, I'm  
 11 sorry to interrupt at this stage but it may become relevant  
 12 later on and I do need to raise an issue now, which is that  
 13 what is being shown on the screen is not in fact  
 14 Opsplatinum.kmz in the form in which it was saved at 5:46  
 15 because what Colonel Scott has done – and I'm not  
 16 suggesting there's anything untoward about this but the  
 17 version that was saved – how Google Earth works is you have  
 18 a key which has a series of icons which will then be  
 19 plotted onto the aerial photograph and you can, by  
 20 adjusting the key on the left, which Colonel Scott is now  
 21 calling up, you can identify which icons you want to  
 22 display at any given time. I wonder, Colonel, if you can  
 23 just click one of the icons to show how it will go away  
 24 when you remove it, so the T for the target. Now all of,  
 25 on the version of the file that was saved at 5:46AM, all of

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1 the – the key was complete but not all of the items were  
 2 marked for display. On another file called  
 3 Opsplatinum.kmz, I think Opsplatinum2 which was saved a  
 4 little later, about 15 minutes later, all of the icons were  
 5 marked for display. It may become relevant at a later  
 6 stage. I just do want to make that distinction now.  
 7 CHAIRPERSON: All I'm concerned with at  
 8 the moment is that we describe the exhibits which have been  
 9 put in so that when we read the record later and when  
 10 subsequent people read the record, it'll be apparent what  
 11 exactly is being talked about at the moment. That's my  
 12 only concern.  
 13 MR CHASKALSON SC: That's precisely my  
 14 point, Mr Chairperson, is what you're looking at on the  
 15 screen is not what someone who subsequently calls up the  
 16 file, the electronic file Opsplatinum.kmz in the form that  
 17 it was saved at 15:46 will see.  
 18 CHAIRPERSON: Well, would you are to  
 19 describe for us, for the purposes of the record, what we  
 20 are now looking at, at the moment so that that problem  
 21 falls away?  
 22 MR CHASKALSON SC: Well, you're looking  
 23 at one of two things. We could describe it in one of two  
 24 ways, either one could say it is the file Opsplatinum2.kmz  
 25 as it would appear when called up, or it would be the file

Now that wasn't the form in which 3 Opsplatinum.kmz was saved at 15:46. I'm not suggesting 4 that anything will turn on this particular example but it 5 may become relevant at a later stage when we're dealing 6 with Google Earth plans and what was visible and what 7 wasn't visible.</p> <p>8 CHAIRPERSON: Yes, I understand. Do you 9 understand my sole concern is that later when the record is 10 read, those who read it must be able to follow what exactly 11 has been said there.</p> <p>12 MR CHASKALSON SC: I wonder if we, if I 13 could suggest possibly a methodology for – well, a way of 14 resolving this problem. If Colonel Scott could re – un- 15 save Opsplatinum.kmz and call it up in the form that it was 16 saved, which in fact Colonel Scott has just done that.</p> <p>17 COLONEL SCOTT: But if I can give clarity 18 –</p> <p>19 CHAIRPERSON: Am I correct in thinking 20 that one has got to read kmz and kmz2, which are the two 21 images that are relevant, we've got to read them together 22 and if one compares one with the other, one then can follow 23 the point that's being made. Is that correct?</p> <p>24 MR CHASKALSON SC: It is for the purposes 25 of describing what one sees, Mr Chairman, but I don't want</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13392</p> <p>1 looking at, at which time, then I think there won't be a 2 problem, at least for the moment.</p> <p>3 COLONEL SCOTT: Right. In essence, I'm 4 not trying to give the full planning briefing. It's just 5 speaking to the strategy still which was derived with 6 Colonel Merafi and two others at that meeting that evening 7 and what was critical there was when Mr Sinclair spoke to 8 us and said, but not the whole 3 000 remains at the koppie 9 overnight. The majority of them move away and there's only 10 a core group which do remain and this gave rise to an 11 opportunistic plan or strategy, if one would, that anyone – 12 and my reasoning at that time was, anybody staying at the 13 koppie, and I know that night was cold, it was close to 14 zero degrees, had to be staying there for a very good 15 reason and had to be possibly part of the core grouping and 16 possibly the grouping that, as we saw, was the smaller 17 grouping that had attacked the police earlier that day.</p> <p>18 It was at this time as well when speaking about 19 the grouping and what would happen to the strikers with Mr 20 Sinclair that he also mentioned to us in the line of, as 21 far as my recollection can go, that the Karee hostel was 22 predominantly an AMCU grouping of men that would stay there 23 and that, explaining to us further about the Wonderkop side 24 which he'd mentioned where the miners' security had died 25 earlier was predominantly a more NUM dominated area. <p style="text-align: right;">Page 13391</p> <p>1 to suggest that the icons that Colonel Scott displayed 2 first up weren't on the file, they were.</p> <p>3 CHAIRPERSON: No, no, I understand that. 4 All we're concerned with is producing an intelligible 5 record, that's all I'm concerned with and if we do it that 6 way the record will be sufficiently intelligible. So 7 Colonel, you understand the problem that I have, I just 8 want it to produce an intelligible record, that's one of my 9 responsibilities.</p> <p>10 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.</p> <p>11 CHAIRPERSON: If you would help me to do 12 that you'll earn my gratitude.</p> <p>13 COLONEL SCOTT: I'll quite simply explain 14 why it is as it is. When we start with a briefing of a 15 plan, you don't put the whole operational concept up. Part 16 of the background to a plan is you first orientate the 17 people that you are briefing to the environment that 18 they're in, thus it is saved in that format and then later 19 you can click on that format when you want to move to 20 showing them the operational concept and all the icons fall 21 into place later in your presentation where you now brief 22 them as to the actual operation and what you want them to 23 do.</p> <p>24 CHAIRPERSON: As long as you make it 25 clear as you proceed with your evidence which image we're</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13393</p> <p>1 the conflict on the Saturday when the grouping tried to 2 march through to go to the NUM offices. So with this 3 background and this understanding now, understanding that 4 the people on the koppie – and I simply give my reasoning 5 at that time – that they possibly came from Karee, that 6 they did not necessarily want to return to Karee, 7 understanding that - and at this same time I understood 8 that the group that the police tried to apprehend on the 9 Monday were actually on their way from Karee to the koppie. 10 Later I learned that they'd actually come from the koppie, 11 going in that direction and were trying to return. And my, 12 as I say, part of what we do when we plan is we're taught 13 to think like our opponents and then to try to counter what 14 our opponents would be doing and thinking like the 15 opponents, knowing that the police had had conflict with 16 them earlier that day, not wanting them to return – I would 17 not want to return to my place of residence knowing that 18 the police could have operations ready to pick me up, 19 specifically knowing that if they come from a hostel, mine 20 security could have identified them. And with that and 21 knowing the conditions of the weather it was, as I say I 22 was out and about at that time, it was really cold, so to 23 be staying out on the mountain or the koppie you needed to 24 have a very good reason.</p> <p>25 My synopsis of that was, is that that's possibly</p>

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1 a core group, it's possibly a group that was involved in  
 2 attacking the police and if we could simply isolate that  
 3 group and prevent others from arriving to reinforce them or  
 4 to assist them, that it would work.

5 We were also told at this time, Mr Sinclair  
 6 mentioned to us that their intelligence sources said that  
 7 there were possibly about 2 000 supporters, would be on  
 8 their way from the Mooinooi area the next morning to come  
 9 and join the gathering at the koppie and this explains why  
 10 I have an early warning team there. If I just – I just  
 11 want to see if I can put the roads in place. This was just  
 12 off the N – I'm not sure what the N, what highway it is,  
 13 it's one of the national roads and at one of the first  
 14 intersections an early warning team just to say whether  
 15 there were people coming in and it gives rise – and I'm  
 16 moving from the outside in now, to why there would be a  
 17 roadblock there and a roadblock here on the two roads which  
 18 would be, that I could see which were coming into the  
 19 koppie. It could stop buses –  
 20 [11:49] MR CHASKALSON SC: Sorry, Colonel, I'm  
 21 sorry to interrupt again. Mr Chairperson, with your  
 22 concern about an orderly record I think it may at this  
 23 point be appropriate to mark –  
 24 CHAIRPERSON: I was at the point of  
 25 saying something about it, it's not good saying a roadblock

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1 here and a roadblock there, here a roadblock there a  
 2 roadblock everywhere a roadblock. That doesn't help us  
 3 when we read the record later. So I understand you've  
 4 shown us a roadblock but I would be grateful if you would  
 5 give a short description as to where it is on the image.  
 6 So the, what you say will be understood by those who read  
 7 it subsequently.

8 COLONEL SCOTT: Okay. There was an early  
 9 warning team of police members positioned possibly a  
 10 kilometre or two north of the N1 highway, on the road  
 11 leading to Mooinooi. We had a roadblock set up which was  
 12 going to be at Marikana town, at the T-junction in the town  
 13 which would have a road travelling towards the east,  
 14 towards the power station and where the koppie is  
 15 ultimately located and then we had a second road block on  
 16 an incoming road, the same road which would lead to  
 17 Marikana town but this time just past the BMR smelter  
 18 towards the, this is towards the east of the koppie, the  
 19 first road block being towards the west of the koppie on  
 20 the same road and that was to stop any mass busses, taxi  
 21 whatever means of transport would be coming because I  
 22 assumed and I think correctly that they would not walk that  
 23 distance to get to the koppie.

24 MR CHASKALSON SC: Mr Chairperson, this  
 25 will be my last interruption. But maybe the best way –

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1 CHAIRPERSON: Make no promises that you  
 2 can't keep, carry on.

3 MR CHASKALSON SC: I can envisage a great  
 4 deal of difficulty in keeping the record intelligible  
 5 because there's going to be a great deal of questioning in  
 6 relation to Google Earth plans and my submission would be  
 7 that we adopt one of two methodologies. The one might be  
 8 each icon on a Google Earth plan has properties which can  
 9 be identified which gives its coordinates. So if Colonel  
 10 Scott for instance goes to one of those road blocks, any  
 11 one and right clicks his mouse and goes down to properties  
 12 we'll have exact coordinates and they might be identified  
 13 that way.

14 CHAIRPERSON: The other one?  
 15 MR CHASKALSON SC: The other one would be  
 16 use the hardcopy and for Colonel Scott to circle the road  
 17 block and say it's at, and mark it A and then speak to it  
 18 as A but I think we need a consistent methodology because  
 19 there will be a lot of questioning around these documents.

20 CHAIRPERSON: Colonel, it's your evidence  
 21 which of those two methods would you prefer?  
 22 COLONEL SCOTT: Sir, I thinks it's  
 23 probably going to be easier to mark the hardcopies, because  
 24 to have to put into exhibit all these lat longs is –  
 25 CHAIRPERSON: Well we will see on the

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1 screen what you're talking about. So if you'd be kind  
 2 enough to mark on your copy the record, we'll trust, you  
 3 don't have to show us every time to make sure it's right.  
 4 If you mark on your copy of the record by indicating what  
 5 it is that you're marking and then at the end of the day  
 6 you can hand it in and that can be photostatted but that's  
 7 probably the sensible way to do it, isn't it.

8 COLONEL SCOTT: Can I request possibly  
 9 that the legal team, I don't have a hardcopy with me. So  
 10 if they can mark what I'm showing. Okay so the road block,  
 11 if we can start at the early warning group as the letter A.

12 CHAIRPERSON: I'm sorry to interrupt you  
 13 Colonel. You say you haven't got the hardcopies yourself.  
 14 I'll give you mine. Now Advocate Pingla points out to me  
 15 that if one looks at JJJ1 one can see a roadblock marked  
 16 and one can see an early warning marked. The only one that  
 17 isn't marked is the second one, the second roadblock. So  
 18 bear in mind what you've got on the copy that you printed  
 19 for us and then in the description you give refer to that  
 20 and if there's something you have to add because it's not  
 21 covered put it in by pen and just say what you've done and  
 22 then at the end of the day we'll get your hardcopy with the  
 23 markings and it will be part of the record.

24 COLONEL SCOTT: Okay we're going back to  
 25 the early warning group. I'll mark that as A. If we move

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1 to the roadblock to the west, I'll mark that as B. If we  
 2 speak to the roadblock which is just south of the koppie  
 3 but east on the road, I'll mark that as C and then zooming  
 4 in to the north was also what I termed a stopper group, in  
 5 case, I couldn't make out whether the pathway that was  
 6 there was a dirt road or just a pathway and so there was a  
 7 stopper group to the north and that will be D. In essence  
 8 now the concept for this operational strategy was going to  
 9 be that as I mentioned we would want to isolate those that  
 10 were on the koppie. In doing so we would utilise the razor  
 11 wire with the public order police Nyalas to do that. That  
 12 part of the operation I foresaw, as you can see there are  
 13 two colours on the screen, there's an orange line and a  
 14 blue line and that the razor wire would be deployed from  
 15 two directions in order to speed it up. This was to be a  
 16 first light operation to in essence give us the element of  
 17 surprise when moving in and that whoever was at the koppie  
 18 would be unprepared or unknowledgeable about what our  
 19 possible tactics may be. Half of the razor wire would move  
 20 to the right on the orange line from the southern side to  
 21 the north and the other half would drive in and deploy  
 22 from, on the blue line from the north towards the south. A  
 23 small exit area which is depicted in pink and we can mark  
 24 that as Echo or E was to be where we would on the opposite  
 25 side as you can see to the Nkaneng area where, is where we

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1 would bring out the strikers as we requested them to come  
 2 out in an orderly fashion. They would be processed there  
 3 in that purple area and weapons either left inside or  
 4 brought with them would be taken from them. At this point,  
 5 at the same echo point you can see the two vehicles that  
 6 are standing there. That signifies, I'm not sure if we  
 7 want to give those a number or not, they're already at the  
 8 Echo or the area marked E, that signified the police  
 9 transportation trucks that the strikers that have been at  
 10 this stage apprehended would be loaded into, would be taken  
 11 to a processing area to be interviewed.

12 CHAIRPERSON: Are these, I think they  
 13 call them cantors.

14 COLONEL SCOTT: Cantors yes.

15 CHAIRPERSON: So these would be two  
 16 cantors?

17 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. At that same point  
 18 there would also be the forensic services as well as the  
 19 detectives who would actually deal with the processing of  
 20 any evidence as well as the processing of the strikers as  
 21 they comes through. So in essence that part of the  
 22 operation which later becomes significant of stage 4 or  
 23 phase 4 is planned for the area called E. During the  
 24 moving in and first encircling and setting out of the  
 25 filtering line what is positioned at Echo E was first to be

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1 positioned what is termed the FHA, it's demarcated on the  
 2 map and that was the forward holding area. So that the  
 3 detectives, the forensic services and the cantor, the  
 4 lorries would not be there until called forward in order to  
 5 continue with the loading or the processing of evidence or  
 6 people. What is shown as an I is in fact –

7 CHAIRPERSON: For those transcribing the  
 8 record by I, you mean the letter I.

9 COLONEL SCOTT: The letter I is actually  
 10 signifying observation post and the observation post that  
 11 you see here has got two vehicles with it, one in green,  
 12 one in red. The green depicts the special taskforce and  
 13 the red depicts the national intervention unit. These two  
 14 were to go to the letter I which is positioned on koppie 3  
 15 as we know it and they were to go to koppie 3, they were to  
 16 establish a reaction team behind what I could see from the  
 17 Google satellite picture I thought it to be some form of a  
 18 small koppie as well and they were to be out of sight. A  
 19 small team from the special task force was to move in  
 20 forward and was to first they would have moved out before  
 21 the rest and they would have had eyes on, as we say onto  
 22 koppie 1 where we assumed that the strikers were and they  
 23 would literally have given the information of what was  
 24 going on while the rest of the police assets were moving  
 25 into their positions.

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1 They had a dual purpose, the national  
 2 intervention unit and the special task force vehicles there  
 3 as a reaction team would respond when requested by the  
 4 operational commander if there were now life threatening  
 5 situations which were occurring with police members, that  
 6 they had better skills to move into to help in those, and  
 7 that was in case the filtering line or the situation at the  
 8 koppie became to dangerous. If I can just go in a closer  
 9 we see figures marked in yellow of what would be almost  
 10 police figures on the Google Earth map. They are  
 11 positioned inside the Nkaneng settlement and those I was  
 12 what I was envisioning to be crime intelligence agents or  
 13 operatives. Either police members themselves or their  
 14 members that they had recruited and I had positioned them  
 15 there for the reason that Mr Sinclair had mentioned to me  
 16 that people had been moving from around the Nkaneng area  
 17 coming through and they actually, they approached the  
 18 koppie through this area.

19 CHAIRPERSON: You say this area?

20 COLONEL SCOTT: This area being through –

21 CHAIRPERSON: Perhaps mark it on your  
 22 hardcopy then we all know what it is.

23 COLONEL SCOTT: It was a general  
 24 direction but it was from the Nkaneng settlement into –

25 CHAIRPERSON: You can mark the general –

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13402</p> <p>1 COLONEL SCOTT: Okay.</p> <p>2 CHAIRPERSON: Sorry to interrupt you.</p> <p>3 You can mark the general direction on the hard copy.</p> <p>4 You've indicated to us on the screen but if you can mark it</p> <p>5 on the hardcopy then it will be permanently recorded.</p> <p>6 COLONEL SCOTT: Alright. What I would</p> <p>7 say then it's the red line area that is running through the</p> <p>8 Nkaneng settlement. There's a red line, although it does</p> <p>9 extend over the veld towards the south, but the red line</p> <p>10 that's running through the Nkaneng settlement is the area</p> <p>11 that the strikers would come out to the koppie during the</p> <p>12 day time.</p> <p>13 CHAIRPERSON: I think you also indicated</p> <p>14 where you anticipated they would leave the red line and</p> <p>15 march, and go towards the koppie, I think perhaps if you</p> <p>16 can draw that on your hardcopy for us.</p> <p>17 COLONEL SCOTT: I'm not understanding,</p> <p>18 Chairperson. The?</p> <p>19 CHAIRPERSON: You've indicated as I</p> <p>20 thought earlier, where you anticipated the strikers would</p> <p>21 move from Nkaneng.</p> <p>22 COLONEL SCOTT: Ja.</p> <p>23 CHAIRPERSON: To the koppie, I thought</p> <p>24 you indicated a spot between the, it's really the second</p> <p>25 and the third car which are to be seen in close proximity</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13404</p> <p>1 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.</p> <p>2 CHAIRPERSON: What you were trying to</p> <p>3 convey to us and a way of ensuring that those who read the</p> <p>4 record subsequently will be able to follow so we can carry</p> <p>5 on now.</p> <p>6 COLONEL SCOTT: Okay.</p> <p>7 COMMISSIONER HEMRAJ: May I just enquire,</p> <p>8 the encircling of the koppie was only in respect of the</p> <p>9 core group that remained overnight?</p> <p>10 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.</p> <p>11 COMMISSIONER HEMRAJ: Thank you.</p> <p>12 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, as I say this was</p> <p>13 to, because we initially we didn't plan, we were actually</p> <p>14 going into to plan for a 3 000 group and how to deal with</p> <p>15 that, how we would approach it on the Tuesday and when we</p> <p>16 did get the information from Mr Sinclair that most of them</p> <p>17 leave overnight and there's only a core group which remains</p> <p>18 we see that as an opportunity to say well lets deal with</p> <p>19 the core group. Let's try and apprehend them and prevent</p> <p>20 others from coming through and that's where you see the</p> <p>21 yellow line, the prevention line is what we call a</p> <p>22 filtering line which was made up of public order policing</p> <p>23 and TRT members. Initially these TRT members would just</p> <p>24 assist the Public Order Policing in the deployment of the</p> <p>25 wire, the razor wire and then move towards the filtering</p>

If I'm correct then you can mark</p> <p>7 that on your hardcopy, if I'm mark please what you had in</p> <p>8 mind.</p> <p>9 COLONEL SCOTT: Okay it was, as I had it,</p> <p>10 Chair, at this stage it was very vague, a very wide, there</p> <p>11 was no specific point which was pointed out to say that's</p> <p>12 where they come through, It was just said they move from</p> <p>13 deeper in the Nkaneng settlement, they walk through it and</p> <p>14 they walk through it onto the koppie. As I say at this</p> <p>15 time and this was later clarified when Mr Sinclair took me</p> <p>16 out to orientate me and we stood at the forward holding</p> <p>17 area where he had actually established his own security</p> <p>18 checkpoints and that's the point where he would show me</p> <p>19 this is Wonderkop Hostel, there's the Nkaneng settlement,</p> <p>20 that's where the koppie is and, as I say, it was a general</p> <p>21 direction which was given which helped to lead to the</p> <p>22 building of this strategy further into the Google map just</p> <p>23 before 6am.</p> <p>24 CHAIRPERSON: I think we've got the</p> <p>25 method working for indicating –</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13405</p> <p>1 line. Now the reasoning behind the filtering line as well,</p> <p>2 as well as what was, we didn't go into in depth what we</p> <p>3 would do necessarily if they refused to come out of the</p> <p>4 razor wire. We just saw, put a barrier up between the</p> <p>5 police and the protestors, we didn't want conflict, we</p> <p>6 didn't want to from a human line which we thought may</p> <p>7 become something that, would be considered to be attacked.</p> <p>8 So the razor wire, put it up and then dialogue with those</p> <p>9 inside to get reason, to get them to exit through the area</p> <p>10 we marked as E, the processing area to get into the trucks,</p> <p>11 hand in their weapons, etcetera. It made sense in that direction but  19 it's not to say that a stage 5 could not be implemented  20 earlier or a stage 6 could be implemented earlier, if  21 intelligence services come with viable information and  22 that's why the NIU and task force were also brought into  23 the area because they could go and work on that information  24 outside of what was happening at the koppie, to try to  25 arrest or gain back stolen items, firearms, and of course</p>

I didn't visibly see  20 them go off and have a meeting together but I did  21 understand that because General Naidoo was deployed in the  22 field and General Mpembe would be busy with strategic  23 negotiations with the presidents of the unions, things like  24 that, that General Annandale would sporadically brief them  25 in an informal fashion on one side when he had the ability</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13428</p> <p>1 MR SEMENYA SC: And as you do on page 42  2 of your statement, you describe what phase 1 would have  3 entailed and the purpose why you would have taken that  4 phase into account, i.e. to seek a peaceful disarmament  5 and dispersion resolution.</p> <p>6 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.</p> <p>7 MR SEMENYA SC: Correct?</p> <p>8 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.</p> <p>9 MR SEMENYA SC: And you explain exactly  10 how the POP members in the armoured vehicles would have had  11 to respond and how the other TRT members would be  12 positioned approximately 100 metres to the rear east, as  13 you describe it.</p> <p>14 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.</p> <p>15 MR SEMENYA SC: And the role of the TRT  16 members would be to assist their colleagues should the  17 strikers threaten the lives of the POP members to the point  18 where they could not escape or were forced to exit their  19 armoured vehicles because of, for instance, the vehicles  20 being set alight.</p> <p>21 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct, as well  22 as to, so to say, guard the rear flank from any approaches  23 from the eastern side.</p> <p>24 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes. As the name stipulates, it is  7 an area for holding your reserves, your contingency forces,  8 et cetera, which is closer to the front but it's not at the  9 front. So the Oryx was simply 23 there, that we would have a standby team that could be, as 24 we called it, on an aerial platform that could be located 25 to areas where anybody that was in trouble, be it media</p>

So these are elements 8 which are, as we would say, standard operating procedures 9 to have part of any plan, to be your emergency services but 10 you'd never place them close to where any conflict could 11 be. That's 22 why the detectives and the forensic services were also 23 placed at the forward holding area, that we had people on 24 immediate standby to deal with any arrested persons and not 25 have to leave that up to the public order policing or the</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13433</p> <p>1 personnel, innocent civilians that may be trying to go to 2 work or miners, police officials that were isolated in 3 certain areas – we really didn't know what to expect when 4 we went to the front so that was just a contingency plan 5 that would be directed then by the police helicopter which 6 would have the command on board.</p> <p>7 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes. You also detail 8 what was conceived to be phase 2, i.e. escalating the 9 levels of force by bringing some of those members from the 10 forward holding areas, is that right?</p> <p>11 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.</p> <p>12 MR SEMENYA SC: The purpose would be, as 13 you call it, the show of force, an attempt at dissuading 14 the crowds into appreciating that there is more than they 15 can handle.</p> <p>16 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, that's correct.</p> <p>17 MR SEMENYA SC: And you tell us that 18 phase 2 was only to be initialised or started when the 19 threat level against the police increased or it became 20 evident the strikers would not want to move away from the 21 koppie if you wanted them to.</p> <p>22 COLONEL SCOTT: It was, I anticipated 23 that if the group wanted to – as I say, the closest what I 24 presumed to be targets for the strikers were to the backs 25 of the police to the east, being the Wonderkop hostel and</p>

Thus the predetermined, deliberate tactical police 2 operation in order to resolve the situation. 3 MR SEMENYA SC: And then you describe 4 phase 4 at the bottom of your statement, page 47. What do 5 you say there? 6 COLONEL SCOTT: That was simply the 7 processing again, as we know it, with the detectives, the 8 crime scene management, et cetera and again there's no plan 9 necessary for them, they work according to their standard 10 operating procedures in how they know how to process 11 arrestees as well as the evidence that they would receive. 12 MR SEMENYA SC: So would be the case in 13 relation to phase 5 and 6, that required no detail because 14 that would be part of what are standard operational 15 practices of the police. 16 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. Many of 17 these units would, when receiving the information, they are 18 trained to make plans there and then. <p style="text-align: right;">Page 13466</p> <p>1 well as the NIU?</p> <p>2 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.</p> <p>3 MR SEMENYA SC: You wanted them to be</p> <p>4 able to respond as speedily as circumstances required?</p> <p>5 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.</p> <p>6 MR SEMENYA SC: And the helicopter, the</p> <p>7 Oryx, what was the plan there?</p> <p>8 COLONEL SCOTT: Well during phase 2,</p> <p>9 during phase 1 the Oryx was predominantly static on the</p> <p>10 ground but in phase 2, being a show of force it was ideal</p> <p>11 to have it airborne so that with the Oryx seen in the air</p> <p>12 it again gives a show of force and dissuasion towards the</p> <p>13 strikers for any violent action.</p> <p>14 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, and you tell us that</p> <p>15 your discussion with General Annandale this time has</p> <p>16 resulted in you abandoning entirely the encirclement</p> <p>17 strategy?</p> <p>18 COLONEL SCOTT: It was at this time</p> <p>19 because as we moved on, part of the success, key points for</p> <p>20 success for the early morning encirclement was the element</p> <p>21 of surprise and as the police were deploying longer and</p> <p>22 being there on more consecutive days so the element of</p> <p>23 surprise was obviously diminishing because they were aware</p> <p>24 of by this time of what assets we had.</p> <p>25 MR SEMENYA SC: And it dawned on you that</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13468</p> <p>1 COLONEL SCOTT: Again it was to, well the</p> <p>2 detail of that was discussed on the Thursday but it was, it</p> <p>3 was just envisioned that we would close off the police</p> <p>4 area, the neutral area, make it a safe area so that any</p> <p>5 action would not result in people fleeing in all directions</p> <p>6 and coming between the police lines and possibly where the</p> <p>7 media were or if we had chosen to move any of the emergency</p> <p>8 services into the now safe area or neutral area to become a</p> <p>9 safe area. So closing it off with razor wire, although it</p> <p>10 was envisioned as well not just to close it off for the</p> <p>11 police, it was also envisioned initially to close it off to</p> <p>12 prevent any movement into the Nkaneng settlement for</p> <p>13 various reasons there as well. The police having to move</p> <p>14 in between the shacks was not ideal with, you know</p> <p>15 belligerent militant strikers now utilising innocent people</p> <p>16 inside there as collateral or you know, it just becomes</p> <p>17 more difficult for the police to have to operate in those</p> <p>18 circumstances and we were also worried about groups like</p> <p>19 this moving into those settlements with the knowledge of</p> <p>20 what happens with xenophobia and if there were any spaza</p> <p>21 shops and the like that possibly the actions of the police</p> <p>22 could cause emotions to rise and anybody that was not part</p> <p>23 of the striking group could become targeted as was</p> <p>24 knowledgeable now from the Monday with seemingly somebody</p> <p>25 that had been attacked going through one of those</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13467</p> <p>1 the strategy might be frustrated by various conduct of the</p> <p>2 protesters in the circles.</p> <p>3 COLONEL SCOTT: Again as I mentioned</p> <p>4 earlier that the fact that they were sitting wider,</p> <p>5 etcetera made us wonder whether we didn't have a leak of</p> <p>6 our own information and strategies from the JOC towards</p> <p>7 them and we needed to, we thought that possibly they had</p> <p>8 reasoned or found out that we had envisioned an</p> <p>9 encirclement.</p> <p>10 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, and you say for good</p> <p>11 reasons that strategy could only be feasible, that is of an</p> <p>12 encircling the people at the koppie for an early morning</p> <p>13 deployment only and not for a group as large as they were</p> <p>14 around the 3 000 mark.</p> <p>15 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. We were</p> <p>16 also, I recall it, one, at one of the JOCCOM meetings its</p> <p>17 either the Wednesday or it could have been mentioned, ja I</p> <p>18 think it was the Wednesday that there was in any case</p> <p>19 insufficient razor wire at that time and I do know that the</p> <p>20 Lonmin mine representative offered to assist but I wasn't</p> <p>21 party to any of those discussions.</p> <p>22 MR SEMENYA SC: Okay. Then an</p> <p>23 alternative suggestion was considered namely to use a POP</p> <p>24 action to disperse the strikers into smaller disorganised</p> <p>25 groups. How was this to happen?</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13469</p> <p>1 settlements and as I say again these spaza shops, etcetera</p> <p>2 become targeted by emotional or angry strikers because of</p> <p>3 police action.</p> <p>4 MR SEMENYA SC: And this made the</p> <p>5 settlement a negative attraction area, did it not?</p> <p>6 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes it did.</p> <p>7 MR SEMENYA SC: And it was also</p> <p>8 considered, you tell us that the strikers could scatter in</p> <p>9 that area and it would make the police operations very</p> <p>10 complicated both for the resistance as well as for the</p> <p>11 police?</p> <p>12 COLONEL SCOTT: It's one of the, the</p> <p>13 public order policing in their tactical options is very</p> <p>14 structured. Working in sections and so on and the moment</p> <p>15 you start moving between informal settlements like that</p> <p>16 where the roads, etcetera, the infrastructure is not as</p> <p>17 prominent as you would find in a normal urbanised area it</p> <p>18 becomes very difficult for them to have to operate in those</p> <p>19 conditions.</p> <p>20 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, and as you tell us</p> <p>21 the dispersal action needed to be away from the police line</p> <p>22 which would be protected by the razor wire, that's how the</p> <p>23 plan had contemplated it to unfold, is that right?</p> <p>24 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, because if one would</p> <p>25 want to, those - again I say those that want to leave after</p>

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1 the warning could leave. Those that remained would need to  
 2 be dispersed and part of the dispersion was therefore then  
 3 to push them into an open area where was no infrastructure  
 4 so that in line with what our strategic guidelines were to  
 5 disarm we would be able to approach groups that were maybe  
 6 trying to regroup and go up to those, isolate them and  
 7 disarm the belligerent protestors within that group,  
 8 smaller groups.

9 MR SEMENYA SC: And within the plan was  
 10 factored how the strikers could move so that they get  
 11 channelled in a way that does not cause a stampede,  
 12 etcetera?

13 COLONEL SCOTT: That was also considered.  
 14 Again that towards the west it was a large open area and  
 15 thus the POP dispersion action was going to be a driving  
 16 action coming from the north and swinging and pushing  
 17 towards the west, to the open ground.

18 MR SEMENYA SC: And that driving would  
 19 also be done sensitive to the, sensitive to the property of  
 20 the mine, strategic property assets of the mine?

21 COLONEL SCOTT: Well this is why we also  
 22 didn't want the protestors going towards the east because  
 23 of that would be the closer mine infrastructure that again,  
 24 and in reflecting on the same thing we experienced that on  
 25 the 16th, on that evening, that after the police action,

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1 mine infrastructure was targeted. So analysis or our  
 2 assessment was correct that that's what we wanted to  
 3 prohibit.

4 MR SEMENYA SC: So what was then  
 5 considered to constitute a positive attraction point would  
 6 be to drive the strikers to the west of the koppie?

7 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

8 MR SEMENYA SC: Away from Nkaneng, as  
 9 well as away from the strategic mine assets?

10 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct and if one  
 11 understands our logic and our thinking at that stage may  
 12 not have covered all bases but what we did was that again a  
 13 dispersion starts with a verbal warning and that those that  
 14 wanted to leave we anticipated would leave and would not be  
 15 part of it. So it's only those that would remain and we  
 16 anticipated that the militant group would possibly be those  
 17 that would be remaining, would be the ones that we need to  
 18 deal with, possibly with others that had - maybe in support  
 19 of them.

20 MR SEMENYA SC: Although phase 3 was not  
 21 discussed in detail the plan envisaged to arrest  
 22 perpetrators who refused to disarm by dispersing them into  
 23 smaller groups, isolating individuals or group and  
 24 disarming them.

25 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct, that was

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1 the strategy.

2 MR SEMENYA SC: And the dispersion  
 3 strategy would enable the police to deal with more  
 4 manageable disorganised groups?

5 COLONEL SCOTT: That was the envisioned  
 6 end state yes.

7 MR SEMENYA SC: And how was the group, I  
 8 asked earlier to be disorganised as you use the word?

9 COLONEL SCOTT: Well even if you stand  
 10 together, it's difficult to do so when you've got a water  
 11 cannon spraying down on you, it's difficult to remain in a  
 12 group because people will start scattering, the force of  
 13 the water will assist in the scattering of people although  
 14 it doesn't cause serious damage or harm to the human being,  
 15 to my knowledge so with that happening that was why it was  
 16 envisioned that the water cannons would play a big role.

17 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, and then you again  
 18 reiterate how the stages would unfold. At paragraph 8.29  
 19 you say after discussion on phase 2 and 3 as was your role  
 20 you started to reason the finer points of the phases. You  
 21 consider the risk and the risk mitigating options with your  
 22 force continuum inasmuch as should a POP tactical action be  
 23 necessary it would need to include the tactical units in a  
 24 secondary phase. What do you mean by secondary phase?

25 COLONEL SCOTT: Obviously in a dispersal

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1 action I had to anticipate again what the militant group  
 2 may do and there were three options in my view. One, they  
 3 may start approaching the public order policing line once  
 4 the public order policing line tried the dispersal action.

5 Two, that they were going to possibly move up onto the  
 6 koppie which I thought was what was more than likely going  
 7 to happen, they would hide between the rocks of koppies 2  
 8 and 1 so that the water cannons or the POP dispersal line  
 9 had no effect on them and three, that they would be moved  
 10 to the open areas where they would have been dispersed into  
 11 smaller groups where hopefully we would be able to deal  
 12 with them. But to deal with the second issue where they  
 13 went to the higher ground that was where the tactical  
 14 forces would be lined up behind the public order dispersion  
 15 line and obviously because it's a close quarter  
 16 environment, its moving on rocks, between rocks, on trees,  
 17 it's not somewhere where the POPs can operate optimally and  
 18 the POPs members are lesser trained in this type of high  
 19 risk arrest to have these tactical units therefore going  
 20 forward to do the high risk arrests of belligerent  
 21 strikers.

22 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, and during the  
 23 course of the day you had assistance of Mr Dirk Botes.

24 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

25 MR SEMENYA SC: And you say you expanded

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1 the Google map to reflect the mine infrastructure which  
 2 could become targets of the unrest, is that right?  
 3 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right.  
 4 MR SEMENYA SC: It was late Wednesday  
 5 afternoon when Major-General Annandale asked you to arrange  
 6 a security detail with transport for the NUM and the AMCU  
 7 presidents who would be going to the koppie to address the  
 8 strikers.  
 9 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct, I was  
 10 asked to put together a small strategy just to get them  
 11 there and to keep them safe which entailed the special task  
 12 force escorting them in separate vehicles. Having a Nyala  
 13 from the front return to where the TRT were positioned and  
 14 then take the groupings forward one at a time to address  
 15 the strikers inside the Nyala.  
 16 MR SEMENYA SC: That is the plan that you  
 17 put in place for the interface with the strikers?  
 18 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.  
 19 MR SEMENYA SC: And the presidents of  
 20 both NUM and AMCU, correct?  
 21 COLONEL SCOTT: Correct.  
 22 MR SEMENYA SC: You got a later feedback  
 23 that evening was that the strikers had shunned the  
 24 president of NUM and more accepted the AMCU president in  
 25 their encounters?

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1 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, that was the  
 2 feedback in the JOC that evening.  
 3 MR SEMENYA SC: And that night there was,  
 4 as you tell us discussion of the way forward and that there  
 5 had been a commitment, so to speak about the laying down of  
 6 the weapons?  
 7 COLONEL SCOTT: I was, in the JOCCOM it  
 8 was said that by 9 o'clock the next day that the strikers  
 9 had undertaken to lay down their weapons.  
 10 MR SEMENYA SC: You say though that that  
 11 struck you as a little strange and why that?  
 12 COLONEL SCOTT: I've had dealings before  
 13 where we've had to operate in areas which are extremely  
 14 rural and I know where, and not just in those environments  
 15 but others to, but I know that normally traditional weapons  
 16 are very personalised towards the men with their culture  
 17 and to attempt to take them away, etcetera can excite or  
 18 promote emotional responses which are uncalled for and to  
 19 me it didn't sound right that they would undertake to come  
 20 to the koppie to lay down their weapons, if they were going  
 21 to come to the koppie they would come unarmed and rather  
 22 leave the weapons at their place of residence for that  
 23 matter. So I was suspicious about what I was hearing.  
 24 MR SEMENYA SC: Okay and in that  
 25 debriefing of that evening there was also information that

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1 the strikers would want to be left alone on the koppie  
 2 overnight, is that correct?  
 3 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, we were asked to  
 4 leave them alone, that they wanted to consult amongst each  
 5 other to determine their way forward.  
 6 MR SEMENYA SC: And of course the  
 7 arrangement was that nothing would be done that evening to  
 8 them?  
 9 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, that, the closest  
 10 that the police would come to the koppie would be to  
 11 forward holding area 1.  
 12 MR SEMENYA SC: The idea was to give that  
 13 conflict 3 resolution of the problem a chance?  
 14 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.  
 15 MR SEMENYA SC: But you still felt that  
 16 you needed to be vigilant regarding a possibility that the  
 17 miners do not, I mean the strikers do not disarm as was  
 18 promised?  
 19 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. One has to cover  
 20 all options and that is the optimistic side as well as the  
 21 pessimistic side of what could occur.  
 22 MR SEMENYA SC: And then on Thursday  
 23 morning at 6 o'clock JOCCOM reconvened you say on page 73,  
 24 is that right?  
 25 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.

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1 MR SEMENYA SC: How would, how long would  
 2 JOCCOM meetings last more or less?  
 3 COLONEL SCOTT: Some mornings, I think  
 4 the average would be about almost two hours, some morning I  
 5 think we sat for two and a half hours.  
 6 MR SEMENYA SC: You say as usual Major-  
 7 General Annandale opened to the JOCCOM meeting conduct the  
 8 roll call to ascertain what resources were available, a  
 9 situation report was given, is that right?  
 10 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 11 MR SEMENYA SC: The crime intelligence  
 12 representative reported that the situation was tense and  
 13 that some strikers had already arrived at the koppie with  
 14 arms, is that right?  
 15 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 16 MR SEMENYA SC: General Annandale then  
 17 spoke to phase 2 and 3 deployment concepts briefly before  
 18 requesting you to give a deployment overview?  
 19 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.  
 20 MR SEMENYA SC: Did you give the  
 21 overview?  
 22 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, I did. What I had  
 23 learnt from the Wednesday was that speaking to slides that  
 24 had a lot of writing on them was not fulfilling the role,  
 25 watching the body language of the audience and so on

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13478</p> <p>1 Thursday I chose to speak more directly to the pictorial 2 slides which is specifically the layout on the Google 3 Earth. 4 MR SEMENYA SC: And this was also given 5 to the commanders that were there. 6 COLONEL SCOTT: There was handouts given 7 on each day to the commanders of the aerial photography 8 with the grids on it, yes, or the satellite pictures with 9 grids on it. 10 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, you also again deal 11 with, during that JOCCOM meeting with greater detail in 12 relation to phase 2? 13 [14:33] COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. Again it was 14 expanded on because it was the, phase 1 in essence now 15 ceased, although to deploy into phase 2 you needed to 16 deploy phase 1 essentially and all we did was we lay it on 17 top of phase 1 the phase 2 which was the inclusion of the 18 razor wire and essentially if a phase 2 was called for in 19 the duration of the day because of threat, we would bring 20 forward a lot of reserve forces. It was, however, decided 21 still on that Thursday morning o go forward with the phase 22 2, place the razor wire, but some of the reserve forces 23 were still remaining at forward holding areas 1 and 2. 24 Again we were uncertain of the plans or the mobility of 25 what the strikers would do –</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13480</p> <p>1 MR SEMENYA SC: That is now the cordon 2 and search one. 3 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct. 4 MR SEMENYA SC: Why was it done at that 5 time? 6 COLONEL SCOTT: Well, again, normally 7 it's a detailed plan that needs to be drafted if you're 8 going to do a cordon and search operation of a hostel. A 9 cordon and search operation would be dictated, time and 10 place, by SAPS, so we should have the ability then to put a 11 more detailed plan in place. So even if the plan was going 12 to be executed at a later time, it still needed to have 13 something that could be accepted and approved before being 14 implemented. And this of course is not as easy as it 15 sounds because one needs to draw in those with the 16 knowledge from the mine and get the plans of the layouts of 17 the hostels and to understand who is staying where, et 18 cetera. So I tried to just realign 6 everything before going out to show the commanders what was 7 going on, and then we left, Brigadier Pretorius and myself. 8 I do remember that after that stage where I was working on 9 my computer, that General Annandale and a couple of others 10 had started a checklist on a flip chart, white board, they 11 were writing down what should be remembered and what needs 12 to be considered before any tactical action gets taken 13 place, but I don't recall, I didn't have input into that 14 and when I was finished with my fixing up of the Google map 15 we literally got into the vehicle and went because time was 16 pressing at that stage. 17 MR SEMENYA SC: Was it then known when 18 the stage 3 operation would commence? 19 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. General Annandale 20 did say he wanted it to commence by 15:30. 21 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes. And when you 22 arrived at forward holding area 1, that's around 14:30 you 23 say? 24 COLONEL SCOTT: On my watch it was 25 exactly 14:30 that we got there.</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13486</p> <p>1 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes and how long did that 2 briefing last?</p> <p>3 COLONEL SCOTT: It's difficult to say but 4 it was at least half an hour, possibly a little more 5 because I know we reported back to the JOC sometime after 3 6 o'clock and the drive to forward holding area is possibly 7 only about five, seven minutes.</p> <p>8 MR SEMENYA SC: And please tell us what 9 you say as the second sentence of paragraph 13.1, page 81?</p> <p>10 COLONEL SCOTT: Well, I can recall on the 11 way thinking that I've got very little time and just 12 contemplating how I was going to deliver what I needed to 13 do and I brought myself back to how we would normally do 14 this and that was just to follow the SMEAC concept and just 15 to tell them the situation. So when all were gathered I 16 climbed into one of the Mercedes Vito vehicles just to get 17 a little bit of shade so that I could put the computer up 18 and all the commanders stood around and I explained to them 19 the situation, which was that we've been told to go to a 20 phase 3, that the threat has elevated and that the 21 resolution through dialogue seems to have failed. And then 22 I went on to just give the basic outline of who had to do 23 what now and what I had done is, this is where the phases 24 became stages because en route there I was working through 25 my mind how better to carry it over and I knew I had to</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13488</p> <p>1 between the police and the strikers – in other words, to 2 use water cannons first if those had hadn't dispersed by 3 verbal warning are still there, to utilise that first to 4 try to get them to move, so we didn't have to have people 5 on people situations.</p> <p>6 The public order policing personnel would be 7 outside of their vehicles, they would be positioned between 8 their vehicles and I mentioned that their vehicles would 9 now be their safe havens, they would retreat into them if 10 they were approached by the militant group but otherwise 11 they would be out. And with water cannons, if that wasn't 12 creating the desired effect one would go over to teargas 13 which would be next far-reaching, less than lethal choice 14 to cause discomfort, to get the strikers to move. 15 Obviously moving closer with the dispersion line and 16 something that does create a bit of a shock factor is your 17 stun grenades, so when you get closer and within throwing 18 distance, stun grenades could be thrown. And then last 19 resort would have been the rubber, the use of rubber to try 20 to get the strikers to move.</p> <p>21 Knowing that the police dispersion line could 22 then swing through, if there were strikers that ran onto 23 the high areas or hid between the rocks, that was the 24 tactical response team who would be positioned 100 metres 25 back and that distance was also important because I didn't</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13487</p> <p>1 break it down into steps for the members and when you work 2 with phases and you need to elevate, you elevate to stages 3 which means your old phases for now become stages and you 4 now have a phase within a stage and that's where initially 5 the first mentioning of stages came into play. So it 6 became stage 3 and I said to them phase 1 would be the 7 department of the razor wire as we know it and after the 8 department of the razor wire – I didn't tell Brigadier 9 Calitz specifically, I mean he's a brigadier, he's a well- 10 experienced POPS man, it wasn't my place to tell him when 11 to give the warning but I told him that we needed to go 12 over to the dispersion action and the way that it would 13 happen was that we would take out the POPS members to the 14 northern side of the razor wire and that they would have to 15 form three channels, in essence, and the far left flank 16 would move around, down the razor wire and then swing to 17 the right and around the bottom of koppie 1. The middle 18 flank would move in the same direction to the south and 19 swing between the two koppies and then the right flank 20 would swing towards the right side of koppie 2 and that 21 would be the dispersion action by POPS. When they had to 22 physically move obviously there would be the force 23 continuum which I also covered just in principle with them 24 because it had slightly changed from what one would be used 25 to because I wanted to keep the difference, the distance</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13489</p> <p>1 want them so close to the public order policing line so 2 that the strikers, if they did approach the public order 3 policing, would be immediately upon a TRT line, in essence. 4 It would give the TRT time to consider response, to give 5 verbal warning, to utilise stun grenades, to go through 6 their own force continuum before having to deal with 7 whatever was approaching them. But in essence their job 8 was to sweep through koppie 2 so that they would go between 9 the rocks and find people that were hiding or people that 10 were waiting in possible ambush and make the necessary 11 arrests or apprehend those people.</p> <p>12 Similarly, the special task force and the NIU had 13 the same role but they would be going to the larger koppie 14 1 where I mostly anticipated that the belligerent group was 15 going to go to. I thought that they would go there, they 16 would go onto the top of that where they would be out of 17 the public order.</p> <p>18 And then as I say, one of the issues I raised 19 there was, there's a dry river bed and through other 20 operations that I've participated in, we always try to 21 reorganise as quickly as possible after we've done 22 something tactical because forces, actions become dictated 23 by your opponent and if he moves left, some of your forces 24 go left. So I created the river bed as a reorganise line 25 where SAPS forces had to stop, reorganise their own forces</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13490</p> <p>1 and now assess what the strikers were doing that had been  2 dispersed out into the field and then from there, the  3 operational commander with other commanders would make  4 judgment calls to say there's a group there and again go  5 out as a structured smaller operation towards that group to  6 go and encircle and disarm smaller groups like that, but  7 that's where the, that's in essence where – and I spoke  8 there now to the razor wire being phase 1 of stage 3, the  9 dispersal action being phase 2 of stage 3 and after the  10 reorganise, the follow-up action of the encircling of  11 smaller disorganised groups and disarming and arresting  12 being phase 3 of stage 3, to them.</p> <p>13 MR SEMENYA SC: Can I ask you to look at  14 slide 81 of exhibit L?</p> <p>15 COLONEL SCOTT: Slide 81?</p> <p>16 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, 8-1, 81. Again, not to be utilised in the  7 POP action however.</p> <p>8 [14:53] We see to the left is a small settlement which is  9 ringed with a red square, I was concerned about that and  10 the police assets that were positioned at forward holding  11 area 2 were tasked to go to that environment and to perform  12 a filtering line in the direction of where the dispersed  13 strikers may be, for the same reason for Nkaneng  14 settlement, we were worried about that settlement that  15 highly emotional or angered strikers may end up running  16 through that for that matter and causing destruction as  17 they went through.</p> <p>18 So forward holding area 2's members were  19 positioned to protect that little settlement and then, I'm  20 not necessarily going according to sequence now, I'm just  21 discussing the slide and then we can obviously see the  22 razor wire which is shown there in the yellow, it still  23 seems to be on the, this one still seems to be on the page  24 2 line however. But we can see the blue line of police  25 vehicles and on this slide I actually took the time to find</p>

Their primary role was going to be to search  11 the rocks in the area for possibly hidden firearms that had  12 been put into the crevices or hidden under bushes, et  13 cetera, after the whole POPS action had swept through.  14 Canine was never to be part of the POPS action with their  15 dogs but they could still be utilised in an environment in  16 a high risk arrest where we had a standoff with tactical  17 forces and a belligerent protester who didn't want to  18 submit, to send – there's other tactics as well which I  19 don't particularly want to speak to through the media  20 exposing it and they would become null and void thereafter  21 but it's well known that a K9 or a dog can be utilised to  22 tackle somebody that's posing a threat to, of that  23 magnitude. So that was their role.</p> <p>24 The mounted unit that was going to forward  25 holding area as well would be a group of persons riding</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13493</p> <p>1 out who was where and try to as accurately as I could, put  2 in who the proper call sign was with what.</p> <p>3 There was only one water cannon at the time when  4 I left to brief, when I arrived at forward holding area 2 a  5 second water cannon arrived and I had only planned one  6 water cannon into the actual fast dispersion line and that  7 was to be in the middle of the group, and when the second  8 one arrived I didn't know where else, I thought we would  9 keep it behind in the police safe area so that they could  10 essentially spray from the razor wire line onto the  11 militant group which was on the other side of the fence,  12 and keep them from trying to break through on the razor  13 wire. Because we know that there are weak points between  14 the vehicle itself and the gap that the trailer has got,  15 that people can come flooding through there. So  16 essentially I wanted that water cannon to stay there, to  17 spray back anybody that tried to come through those gaps in  18 the razor wire line.</p> <p>19 And then we have got the orange, which shows the  20 TRT line behind POP's and then of course the NIU and the  21 special task force line behind that. I take it, the slide now being 8 exhibited, is this what was being looked for Mr Semenya? 9 MR SEMENYA SC: Indeed, Chair. 10 CHAIRPERSON: You are still under oath, 11 Colonel. Mr Semenya? 12 MR SEMENYA SC: Colonel, we have up in 13 the screen there slide 181, what message does that convey? 14 COLONEL SCOTT: What you see on screen 15 is, to the best of my recollection I must state as well, 16 because as I say that day was, but it's what I have shown 17 to the people at forward holding area 1, and to the best of 18 my recollection, it's the same slide as well or the same 19 Google picture that was then put into a slide. I may be 20 incorrect in that but this is what I could find, and I know 21 that this comes from that time period. But I know that I 22 did work on the forward holding area 2 slide to better 23 tweak it for the presentation at the front. The inserts 24 that you see in the white blocks and the blue arrows, were 25 what I inserted afterwards after briefing the members at</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13496</p> <p>1 strategy with POP's in the front and your TRT and your NIU, 2 STF behind and then to move forward on that after the 3 verbal warnings had expired, and they would swing on the 4 blue arrows as you can see them. 5 There was a left, middle and a right flank and as 6 you can see the flanks had to push through with that motion 7 in order to get the strikers to move towards the west. 8 Then we have got, what's not too visible now, I'm not sure 9 how to show it to you, but there is a small blue arrow 10 which is on the right flank. The tip of the arrow is 11 almost on a very faint indentation line which is actually a 12 dry riverbed, and it's on that line that I explained was 13 the - that's where more or less where all the arrows are 14 pointing towards, that is where the reorganisation, stop 15 and reorganise line would be, reassess your situation, look 16 at what your opponents have done and then reorganise and 17 push forward with phase 3, which was then to encircle your 18 smaller disorganised groups, disarm, arrest and the 19 processing would then start thereafter, and then you can 20 just see the icons showing the forward holding area 2 21 personnel down to the bottom on that side which I had moved 22 there as well, it's the informal settlement. 23 MR SEMENYA SC: And if we show slide 229, 24 that would give us more or less an idea of what you say is 25 the indentation of the riverbed.</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13495</p> <p>1 the front, to more accurately depict the briefing that was 2 given to them, and what you can see there is the red icon 3 vehicles along the orange line, and those are Nyalas 1 to 6 4 and those Nyalas are the razor wire Nyalas. 5 Now their duty was to deploy the phase 1 of stage 6 3 and that was to put the razor wire in place which would 7 create the safe zone and would assist with channelling the 8 strikers towards the west to the open fields. 9 We used the power station as a natural barrier, 10 the fence line was the power station to start the razor 11 wire deployment there so as to, again cause the strikers to 12 move towards the open fields to the west. You can see the 13 blue line of vehicles towards the north and we have got an 14 arrow which has got first line POP pointing towards that 15 and then we have got a, the green vehicles with the red 16 sort of police icons, and that is showing the TRT, NIU and 17 STF line initially. Although those were briefed to be 18 separate, it's difficult to make all of that happen in a 19 short time period. Google Earth has its own challenges 20 about how together you can put icons, etcetera before they 21 really overlapping. So it's not in proportion to obviously 22 what has to be shown, but it was the best that could be 23 done, and phase 2 was then to regroup and push forward to 24 employ POP's dispersion strategy, to in other words go 25 outside of the safe area, form up in the dispersion</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13497</p> <p>1 COLONEL SCOTT: Slide 229? 2 MR SEMENYA SC: 229, yes. Is that the 3 one on the screen? 4 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct, yes 5 that's correct. That's maybe a little bit to the left but 6 you can see just in front of the white vehicles that have 7 stopped there, there's a natural feature in the terrain 8 which causes the armoured vehicles to have to slow down, to 9 come almost to, well it has to come to a halt and negotiate 10 the river bed, and that was seen as the stop and reorganise 11 line, yes. 12 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, you call it that 13 reorganisation point, what was to be reorganised there 14 according to plan? 15 COLONEL SCOTT: Again after the 16 dispersion has taken place, it's difficult to say what the 17 actions of the strikers would have been, understanding and 18 hoping that many of them would have moved towards the west. 19 That the public order policing forces that have pushed 20 through to stop at that point, would now have the tactical 21 forces behind them clearing koppies 2 that we can see there 22 and koppie 1, and at that time the operational commander 23 would then take decisions on how further to continue with 24 the operation, assessing the movements of where the 25 strikers have gone and what they have done.</p>

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1 MR SEMENYA SC: So beginning -  
 2 CHAIRPERSON: He was supposed to?  
 3 COLONEL SCOTT: That's the briefing.  
 4 CHAIRPERSON: He was supposed to do that?  
 5 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.  
 6 MR SEMENYA SC: That's how the plan  
 7 contemplated to unfold, is that right?  
 8 COLONEL SCOTT: That is how I  
 9 contemplated the plan to unfold, yes.

 11 that beginning paragraph 13.8, "and this is now according  
 12 to plan, there would have been the warning", correct?

 18 the deployment of the wire, the warning that is?

 23 by the commander given to the protestors to disperse?

 25 operating procedure, according to the size of the crowd,

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1 etcetera, there would be a reasonable time given for them

 22 the commanders there. You showed them a geographical  
 23 picture of the area.

It could</p> <p>8 be seen very vaguely and was also quite a distance off, so</p> <p>9 I chose not to actually try to watch there because we stood</p> <p>10 next to the radio to listen.</p> <p>11 MR SEMENYA SC: And for that you</p> <p>12 stationed yourself, you positioned yourself next to the</p> <p>13 police radio based in the JOC and to try and piece together</p> <p>14 information as it was coming through?</p> <p>15 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.</p> <p>16 MR SEMENYA SC: And at paragraph 19 you</p> <p>17 say "after Brigadier Calitz had initiated the operation,</p> <p>18 some minutes later you heard the intensity increase in the</p> <p>19 radio communication between Brigadier Calitz calling from</p> <p>20 Papa1, is that right?</p> <p>21 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, that is correct.</p> <p>22 MR SEMENYA SC: And that he was</p> <p>23 repeatedly calling the water cannons to come forward and</p> <p>24 engage?</p> <p>25 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 13504</p> <p>1 like the scenario, the scenario you had forecast with the</p> <p>2 protestors taking up position to shoot at the police line?</p> <p>3 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, I anticipated that</p> <p>4 could be a possibility.</p> <p>5 MR SEMENYA SC: That was the mental</p> <p>6 picture that was created in your mind.</p> <p>7 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.</p> <p>8 MR SEMENYA SC: And you heard a broadcast</p> <p>9 on the Protea Coin helicopter video footage, which was the</p> <p>10 coordination from Lieutenant-Colonel Vermaak and Brigadier</p> <p>11 Calitz also giving instruction over the radio?</p> <p>12 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes, and I referred to it</p> <p>13 here because it similar to what one would hear on that</p> <p>14 Protea Coin helicopter what we have heard there, is what I</p> <p>15 was hearing in the JOC at the same time.</p> <p>16 MR SEMENYA SC: And you say that there</p> <p>17 was about four minutes where the radio systems appeared</p> <p>18 jammed, why do you say that, that they were jammed?</p> <p>19 COLONEL SCOTT: I remember being</p> <p>20 frustrated, sometimes it happens in police communications</p> <p>21 that somebody pushed their talk button by mistake and maybe</p> <p>22 sits on a radio or something and nobody can speak. But</p> <p>23 there was a time period for at least four minutes during</p> <p>24 the operation where no one, you could hear somebody was</p> <p>25 keying a radio and there was no communication, nobody could</p>

10 Provincial Government portfolio committee on the events in

11 Marikana.

12 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

13 MR SEMENYA SC: The presentation you gave

14 included what you had shown to the media but included more

15 input with slides representing oral information now, is

16 that right?

17 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

18 MR SEMENYA SC: But before the Commission

19 was announced you started updating the planning slide show

20 for inclusion in these presentations to better reflect what

21 was said on the days before and on the 16th of August, you

22 tell us.

23 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

24 MR SEMENYA SC: And you deal then later

25 with the visit to Marikana by Mr Malema.

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1 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right.

2 MR SEMENYA SC: And what arrangements

3 were done in relation to that visit, correct?

4 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

5 MR SEMENYA SC: But beyond that period,

6 around the 18th and onwards, what was happening in Marikana

7 really was an attempt at maintaining stability and putting

8 police presence there, correct?

9 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes.

10 MR SEMENYA SC: And it was more sector

11 policing strategy and make sure that the situation is kept

12 under control.

13 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right, visible

14 policing.

15 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes. You deal with that

16 against paragraph 30 and the activity the week after the

17 Marikana incident.

18 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

19 MR SEMENYA SC: You were part of what

20 happened at Roots.

21 COLONEL SCOTT: I was, yes.

22 MR SEMENYA SC: And you say that after

23 demobilising from the Marikana on the 24th, you were called

24 to report to Roots and you were there on 27th August 2012

25 until the 7th of September?

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1 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

2 MR SEMENYA SC: Your account of events at

3 Roots was that you were tasked by General Annandale to

4 prepare a presentation on the events at Marikana for the

5 Commission of Inquiry, this is the Commission, correct?

6 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

7 MR SEMENYA SC: You also recall there

8 were work sessions, being about reconstructing the

9 incidents with different commanders and key role players

10 grouped per geographical incident.

11 COLONEL SCOTT: That's right.

12 MR SEMENYA SC: And you also say that

13 there were members who were sent to different breakaway

14 areas to compile their version, they would then report back

15 to Colonel Visser of the North-West Province for

16 assimilation.

17 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

18 MR SEMENYA SC: And you were also

19 assisting in the compilation of that presentation for the

20 Commission.

21 COLONEL SCOTT: yes.

22 MR SEMENYA SC: You say you worked in

23 unison with Colonel Visser and you assisted him in

24 gathering much of the historic information and

25 consolidating the information from the breakaway groups.

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1 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

2 MR SEMENYA SC: You say the reason for

3 being involved in compiling the presentation for the

4 Commission was because you had started drafting a

5 presentation on the Friday, 17th, with the first audience

6 being the media at the Lonmin Game Farm auditorium.

7 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

8 MR SEMENYA SC: On 6 September you tell

9 us, Colonel, that you and Colonel Visser presented the

10 police presentation to the National Commissioner.

11 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

12 MR SEMENYA SC: You had presented it a

13 day before to members who were at Roots for their comments

14 and inputs.

15 COLONEL SCOTT: That's correct.

16 MR SEMENYA SC: And that became, as you

17 call it, the first official draft of the events at Marikana

18 as the police would represent them.

19 COLONEL SCOTT: Yes. There were, I

20 think, more than one working documents in getting to this

21 end of Roots National Commissioner briefing. They could

22 also possibly have been so but this was the accepted one at

23 the end of Roots.

24 MR SEMENYA SC: But there was an enormous

25 amount of material that you were working with, correct?
