 4 with us this morning to resume his cross-examination of the
 5 National Commissioner but he had to have a further
 6 procedure on Thursday and he is still in hospital and it's
 7 not clear at this stage when precisely he will be
 8 discharged. So in the circumstances therefore I'm afraid
 9 we can't proceed with the evidence of the National
 10 Commissioner. Mr Gumbi, I think had better wait as well

 25 also killed during an intervention between the police and

 13 Brigadier Tsiloane earlier. Why were you with him coming

 17 meeting, but more pertinently because he is the section
 18 head for National Intervention Unit. There was already
 19 some of his members deployed on that Sunday, and I intended
 20 deploying more National Intervention Unit members. I knew
 21 that this deployment will probably mean that we have to get
 22 people from various of his units, seeing that the capacity
 23 is not necessarily available in Pretoria, but also
 24 Brigadier Tsiloane is an experienced Public Order Policing
 25 member and has held various specific positions within

1 Public Order Policing. I think he worked in Public Order
 2 Policing environment for more than 10 years.
 3 MR SEMENYA SC: You and him then arrive

 22 members, as well as NIU members, that they responded to a
 23 group of protesters and that in the response they met this
 24 group of people who were situated just to the side of a
 25 railway line and he said that Major-General Mpembe then

 2 basically negotiated with the specific group in an attempt

 19 After that briefing I left the scene and I went
 20 to an area where they directed me to, on the facility of
 21 the Lonmin Mine, it's a facility, the best I can describe
 22 it, I think they do the disaster management response from
 23 there, be it then fire or medical or whatever. I'm not too
 24 sure in terms of the, of what the name of the facility is.
 25 My arrival at this facility I was met by Major-General

1 Mpembe. Brigadier Calitz was also present. I also met
 2 with Major-General Naidoo and the Provincial Commissioner

 17 started moving, that a number of the Public Order Policing

 21 protector vehicles, and then he relayed also that two
 22 police officers died, the one that was injured, the other
 23 people that died, as well as then the firearms and the
 24 radio that was taken.

 22 Colonel Scott has. Colonel Scott is not only familiar with
 23 the working of Special Task Force, NIU, TRT, but also with
 24 that of the Public Order Policing in that he himself was a
 25 Public Order Policing member prior to joining the Special

1 Task Force. He also did the operational commanders'
 2 training in 2002, which was a training specifically around,
 3 or part of that was the planning of crowd management
 4 incidents. I can just mention that on that specific course
 5 he was the best performer and the best achiever in that

 8 then also Colonel Scott was one of the planners in terms of

 12 him there to come and coordinate such a planning for me.

13 MR SEMENYA SC: Do you see the National
 14 Commissioner the evening of that day?

15 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: I did indeed,
 16 yes, Chairperson. I do not know what time the National
 17 Commissioner arrived, but I saw her after 8 on that
 18 evening. She was accompanied by Lieutenant-General Petros,
 19 who is the Provincial Commissioner for the Gauteng
 20 province.

21 MR SEMENYA SC: What then happened with
 22 the National Commissioner in your presence?

23 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: We went to the
 24 area that's now known as the JOC, which is a thatch-roof
 25 facility within that bigger area that I earlier described.

1 Present were the National Commissioner, Colonel-General
 2 Petros, Mbombo, Major-General Naidoo and Mpembe, myself,
 3 Brigadier Calitz, if I can recall also Brigadier Van Zyl
 4 and Brigadier Engelbrecht. Brigadier Van Zyl and
 5 Engelbrecht, they were introduced to me as respectively the
 6 head of Detective Services, as well as then Engelbrecht
 7 being from Crime Intelligence. Lieutenant-Colonel Scott
 8 was also there. He arrived probably at about half past 7
 9 that evening prior to the, to this specific meeting. If I
 10 can recall there was also Adv Moolman from the SAPS Legal
 11 Services. That was more or less the people that I can
 12 remember that were there.

13 MR SEMENYA SC: The National Commissioner
 14 gets the briefing the same as you did, and the one you
 15 relayed about the events up to that point.

16 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That is
 17 correct, Chairperson. She was mostly briefed by General
 18 Mpembe, as well as Brigadier Calitz, with input from the
 19 Provincial Commissioner, Commissioner, or Lieutenant-
 20 General Mbombo.

21 MR SEMENYA SC: Will this be a convenient
 22 stage to –

23 CHAIRPERSON: Mr Semenya, we will take
 24 the lunch adjournment at this stage. We'll resume at half
 25 past 1.

 2 [13:33] CHAIRPERSON: The Commission resumes. U

4 CHARL ANNANDALE: Dankie, Voorsitter.
 5 VOORSITTER: Mnr Semenya.

6 EXAMINATION BY MR SEMENYA SC (CONTD.):
 7 Thank you, Chair. Before break we had just discussed that
 8 the National Commissioner is with you in the joint
 9 operations centre and that she receives a briefing from
 10 General Mpembe and Brigadier Calitz. Remember that?

11 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 12 yes, I can remember that.

13 MR SEMENYA SC: Is there a discussion
 14 there as to the genesis of this unrest, what explains the
 15 unrest in Marikana?

16 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: There was no
 17 detailed discussion in terms of that, but as part of the
 18 briefing and the overview that was given by the three
 19 respective officers, as I've mentioned, General Mbombo,
 20 Calitz and Mpembe, it was indicated that there was a build-
 21 up in terms of wage negotiation. There was also mention
 22 made of a minority union AMCU, and then the majority union
 23 NUM, that they were in dispute in terms of a specific wage
 24 negotiation deal that was in place for two years, which was
 25 in place and duly signed for a two-year period, that AMCU

1 did not have bargaining rights, apart from that limited
 2 rights at the Karee Mine, and that there was specific
 3 reference made to a dispute, conflict between the two
 4 parties on the Saturday, and it was mentioned about the
 5 rock drill operators that was the integral, or the
 6 initiating party in terms of this dispute, and that there's
 7 a general wage, demand of a wage increase to R12 500. It
 8 was also mentioned that there's various incidents of
 9 intimidation. They were relating a number of specific
 10 incidents that have taken place and that the broader
 11 community, that the people are living in fear.

12 MR SEMENYA SC: And that there have been
 13 fatalities up to that point.

14 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 15 that's correct. There was reference made to the conflict
 16 on the Saturday between the two unions where people were
 17 injured, as well as an incident where there were two
 18 security guards of the Lonmin Mine that, in a process where
 19 they were trying to stop a group of protesters. The two
 20 security guards were isolated from the rest of their
 21 deployment and that both of them were killed and that also
 22 a fire – a vehicle was set alight with the one security
 23 guard's body that was inside, or partially inside that
 24 vehicle, and also that their firearms, I think that there
 25 were one or two, two shotguns that were taken from them,

Page 8211

1 and then obviously the events on the Monday where the five
2 people died.

3 MR SEMENYA SC: The following day was the
4 14th. Can you talk about that day?

5 COMMISSIONER HEMRAJ: Mr Semenya, before
6 you go to the 14th, with regard to the reinforcements, is
7 the witness able to tell us who requested them, whether
8 there were specific units requested, or whether it was the
9 witness's decision?

10 MR SEMENYA SC: Indeed, Madam
11 Commissioner. Can you shed some light?

12 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, I
13 can. The Provincial Commissioner for Gauteng was present
14 on that Monday evening and he gave his commitment in terms
15 of specific resources that he will assist us with. He has
16 mobilised Brigadier Fikter with some of his members from
17 the operational coordination centre in Gauteng province. I
18 think they were in total around six people that responded
19 late on that Monday evening. He specifically wanted them
20 to focus in terms of the gathering and collection of
21 intelligence, and he committed then people from his Public
22 Order Policing unit and Tactical Response Team members. I
23 really cannot say whether he then spoke to his Deputy
24 Provincial Commissioner that would be responsible for
25 operations in terms of making that available. In all

1 probability it was a discussion then that he gave the
2 authority and then it was a discussion probably between
3 General Mpmembe and then General Gela who is the Deputy
4 Provincial Commissioner for Operations in Gauteng in terms
5 of the availability of those resources. But what I know is
6 that none of those people responded, apart from the ones
7 from Brigadier Fikter responded on that Monday night, so we
8 received additional personnel from Gauteng on the Tuesday.

9 MR SEMENYA SC: Do you have an
10 independent recollection of the numbers?

11 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Can you please
12 repeat that? I did not hear.

13 MR SEMENYA SC: What numbers were called
14 and how many arrived? Do you know?

15 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: There were from
16 KwaMhlanga, there were probably around 19 Public Order
17 Policing members.

18 MR SEMENYA SC: There had been
19 [inaudible].

20 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: More or less.
21 It might be a few less. There were also from the Free
22 State, Welkom and Bethlehem, if I can remember, probably
23 combined not more than 20, and then the deployment from
24 Public Order Policing Gauteng varied on the Tuesday, the
25 Wednesday, and the Thursday. On the Tuesday I can honestly

Page 8213

1 not say what was the numbers. On the Wednesday Public
2 Order Policing was probably in the area of close to 200
3 from Gauteng. There are three units in Gauteng, and then
4 on Thursday Public Order Policing Gauteng was probably
5 reduced to around 150 more or less.

6 CHAIRPERSON: You said they had some
7 other crowd control matters they had to attend to in
8 Gauteng on the Thursday.

9 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That is
10 correct, Chairperson.

11 CHAIRPERSON: Now I take it you had a
12 meeting then in the JOC after you'd spoken to the Lonmin
13 people and got this information that you told us about.
14 Presumably you didn't discuss deployments and getting in
15 reinforcements in the presence of the Lonmin people. Did
16 you actually meet the Lonmin people in the JOC or did you
17 meet them in their part of the building, as it were?

18 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
19 there was three meetings on that Monday evening. The first
20 one was the initial briefing that was given to the National
21 Commissioner. After that there was a meeting that was
22 probably around half past 9, which was in a separate
23 facility, but close to the JOC.

24 CHAIRPERSON: That was with the Lonmin
25 people?

1 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That's correct,
2 Sir, and then some of us went to that meeting with the
3 Lonmin management. It was inclusive of the National
4 Commissioner and the Provincial Commissioners, the two of
5 them, General Naidoo, General Mpmembe. I was there for part
6 of the meeting, and then I was back at the JOC in terms of
7 trying to orientate us with aerial photographs, Google
8 photos, and so on. I think Brigadier Calitz stayed behind,
9 Colonel Merafi and Colonel Scott stayed behind, but there
10 was a meeting with a number of people from Lonmin at that
11 time. I can remember two specifically, a Graham Sinclair
12 was there with his involvement in security –

13 CHAIRPERSON: I think he's in charge of
14 their security, as far as I can see.

15 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That's correct,
16 Chairperson, and then I can remember there was a Mr Mark
17 Munro. I do not know what's his position at Lonmin, and
18 people that later I came to know of them as, I think a Mr
19 Mokwena and probably a Mr Kgotle, and there were other
20 people, but I never - why I'm mentioning these, because I
21 had subsequent interaction with some of the Lonmin
22 management, and after that meeting, Chairperson, we
23 returned to the, let's call it the police JOC where we had
24 the original group of police officers, excluding the
25 representatives from Lonmin, where we then had certain

1 discussions.

2 CHAIRPERSON: And did that meeting go on

3 till midnight or beyond?

4 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, if

5 my memory serves me correct, we started with that meeting

6 probably just prior to 11 o'clock that night and I think

7 the National Commissioner left around 1 o'clock the next

8 morning. Then some of us still remained. Myself left at

9 about 01:30 that morning and specifically we left Colonel

10 Scott and Colonel Merafi, the two of them, to continue with

11 getting orientation of the area and getting information in

12 terms of a proposed planning.

13 MR SEMENYA SC: Regarding the time when

14 you were in the meeting with Lonmin management, what was

15 the nature of the conversation?

16 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,

17 the part that I attended had to do with the Lonmin

18 management, one of two people; they were supplementing one

19 another in terms of giving an overview. They were

20 basically indicating again the two groupings in terms of

21 AMCU and NUM. They mentioned the wage agreement that was

22 in place for two years. They've confirmed that there was a

23 specific demand from rock drill operators. They said that

24 they do not have specific detail in terms of any of the

25 people – I might just add that earlier in the first

Page 8216

1 briefing General Mpembe showed some photos to the National

2 Commissioner in terms of people that were identified during

3 the incident that he had earlier the day, and there was a

4 discussion if these people are specifically known to the

5 Lonmin management. They indicated that they are not

6 familiar with individuals. Then there was a discussion in

7 terms of the National Commissioner appealed that there

8 should be constructive negotiation between Lonmin as the

9 employer and the respective union leadership, and that

10 there should be a partnership between the police and

11 themselves in terms of the sharing of intelligence and

12 information. She stressed the importance in terms of that

13 the people responsible for the murders, that we should

14 obtain or get all the possible assistance that we can in

15 terms of the investigation against those people so that

16 arrests can be carried out. She also made mention in terms

17 of that there's a number of police firearms as well as then

18 security firearms that are in the hands of people after

19 they robbed it from the respective security and police, and

20 that it's important that we work together in terms of

21 finding that back, and the Lonmin management gave their

22 commitment in terms of that they will provide the

23 assistance, that if they would know if they would have

24 information in terms of individuals involved, they will

25 obviously share it with us, and they indicated that Mr

Page 8217

1 Graham Sinclair would be our liaison and confirmed that we

2 can utilise their facility as the joint operational centre

3 because at that time the joint operational centre was in a

4 different facility, which was more sort of a radio room of

5 the security of the mine, where we also had police

6 representation. That was more or less the crux of the

7 discussion that I can remember, Sir.

8 MR SEMENYA SC: Okay, was there a

9 discussion about the possible resolution of the wage

10 dispute?

11 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: The only

12 discussion was that Lonmin indicated that in terms of the

13 agreement and the Labour Act, that they cannot enter into

14 negotiations with specifically AMCU, but mostly because

15 there was already a two-year agreement signed.

16 MR SEMENYA SC: You again come back to

17 Marikana the 14th.

18 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That is

19 correct, Chairperson. I returned after 10 o'clock on that

20 Tuesday morning.

21 MR SEMENYA SC: Anybody with you?

22 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: I returned with

23 the Brigadier Tsiloane again, as well as then Brigadier

24 Fritz.

25 MR SEMENYA SC: Do you recall around what

Page 8218

1 time are you in Marikana?

2 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,

3 that must have been close to 10:30 that morning.

4 MR SEMENYA SC: Any particular

5 responsibility you had?

6 [13:53] MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, my

7 specific responsibility at that time was to coordinate the

8 deployment of the units that I had there, the units being

9 National Intervention Unit, as well as the Special Task

10 Force. Because our numbers increased, NIU on that Tuesday

11 we mobilised in total more than 100 personnel, as well as

12 then the daytime deployment for Special Task Force and the

13 night-time deployment of Special Task Force. I also had a

14 small deployment of about 10 officers from a unit known as

15 Mobil Operations, and I had that unit there in terms of

16 they specialised in the escorting, or providing escort

17 duties, protection duties during in-transit movements, and

18 I wanted them there in terms of if you have to do movement

19 between the operational centre area, which is about three

20 and a half kilometres from the koppie area, but also in

21 terms of then visibility patrols, and I saw it fit to be

22 there myself to coordinate these numbers.

23 MR SEMENYA SC: Who is in the joint

24 operation centre at this time?

25 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That was Major-

Page 8219

1 General Mpmembe, Major-General Naidoo, Brigadiers Calitz,
 2 Van Zyl, Brigadier Engelbrecht, Brigadier Seboloke.
 3 Brigadier Pretorius joined us later on during that Tuesday;
 4 I think he was there on my arrival. Then Brigadier Fritz
 5 and Brigadier Tsiloane, and Lieutenant-Colonel Scott, and
 6 then commanders from Public Order Policing units, even
 7 although they were not full-time in the JOC, but they were
 8 present in the JOCOM meetings, and for that same matter in
 9 terms of people from, commanders from K9, commanders from
 10 the Air Wing, commanders from the TRT. There might be one
 11 or two that I've just missed.

12 MR SEMENYA SC: That morning you had a
 13 conversation with Lieutenant-Colonel Strydom, Dr Strydom.

14 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 15 that is correct. On the Monday evening we started
 16 discussing the, an option in terms of that we can enter
 17 into dialogue with the protesters. I phoned Dr Strydom,
 18 who is the coordinator at a national level at the division
 19 Visible Policing of all hostage and suicide prevention
 20 negotiators in the country. I have indicated, and I've
 21 sketched the situation to him. I can just mention that
 22 Colonel Strydom started the hostage negotiation concept in
 23 our country probably in the late 80s, early 90s, probably
 24 maybe '89 to '91, and he's still today familiar with all of
 25 the hostage negotiators and suicide prevention individuals

1 that's deployed in the country, and I requested him to find
 2 me the appropriate team to actually be able to deal with
 3 such a situation, and he indicated that he will deploy such
 4 a team.

5 MR SEMENYA SC: What was the strategy at
 6 that point?

7 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, as
 8 there was no constructive negotiation taking place at that
 9 time, we had this group of protesters already on that
 10 Tuesday, even on the Monday, I mean it was reckoned between
 11 2 and 3 000, so we had some additional grouping, the 2, 300
 12 people that General Mpmembe had the dealings with on the
 13 Monday, plus then a separate group of more or less 3 000
 14 people and there were no specific negotiations taking
 15 place, so we had this grouping move and we will have them
 16 at the specific koppie, and there was no engagement in
 17 terms of any dialogue with them from any party, and we felt
 18 that from the SAPS' side that we should go and see if we
 19 cannot enter into dialogue with them and see if we cannot
 20 identify a leadership that we can then see how we can
 21 peacefully resolve the situation. We had a serious concern
 22 in terms of how to deal with the situation. The commanders
 23 that were there, none of them has dealt with such a
 24 sizeable group in terms of, and then the arms that
 25 specifically a smaller group had in their possession, and

Page 8221

1 that was the main specific reason, so that we could enter
 2 into dialogue and a process that we can through that save
 3 lives and injuries, as well as then further intimidation.

4 MR SEMENYA SC: What was the response for
 5 your request for negotiators?

6 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 7 later on, on that Tuesday morning before 12 o'clock, as I
 8 can recall, there was a response from a Lieutenant-Colonel
 9 McIntosh. Lieutenant-Colonel McIntosh had three other
 10 negotiators with him. One of them was a psychologist. In
 11 terms of the functioning of such a team they would operate
 12 with a bigger team, so you'll have a primary negotiator and
 13 then you'll have a secondary negotiator, and you will have
 14 an analyst which the, is the function performed by the
 15 psychologist, and then you will also have a data collector
 16 person that would coordinate, would basically keep record.
 17 The other people, I cannot really recall their names now,
 18 but Colonel McIntosh was as the, let's call him the
 19 coordinator of the team, introduced to me.

20 MR SEMENYA SC: Just for the record, does
 21 the name Rheeder, does the name Colonel Rheeder, Captain
 22 Papi Phitsane, and Captain Greyling, do those names ring a
 23 bell?

24 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Absolutely,
 25 yes. Colonel Rheeder was the psychologist.

1 MR SEMENYA SC: What were they tasked
 2 with?

3 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 4 I've tasked Brigadier Calitz as well as Brigadier Fritz to
 5 go and sit down with them and give them a briefing in terms
 6 of the situation. I specifically asked Brigadier Calitz,
 7 because of him being a trained negotiator himself, and he
 8 also holds an advanced diploma in negotiation, and
 9 Brigadier Fritz in terms of his understanding, having
 10 worked with the hostage negotiation team on many occasions
 11 over many years, and I've asked them to specifically go and
 12 brief them in terms of the tasking, that they should go
 13 with Brigadier Calitz in his command Nyala and that they
 14 should go and establish rapport with a leadership. In this
 15 group they must go and find a leadership and convince
 16 people to come forward so that we can create some entry
 17 into dialogue. I said that the total aim would be that we
 18 will negotiate in terms of finding a resolution, a peaceful
 19 one at that, and that the people should, that they should
 20 be convinced to lay down their weapons, that they should
 21 not negotiate on labour related issues, that they should
 22 try to convince this grouping of going back to their work
 23 stations, because Lonmin indicated that once these people
 24 are back in their work stations, constructive negotiation
 25 can start through the existing channels that is in place.

1 I also advised that they should find an interpreter because
 2 it was indicated by General Mpembe that on the day that the
 3 group preferred to speak in Fanagalo and I have said that
 4 we should make such a request to the Lonmin to see if they
 5 would have such a person available, and at a later stage I
 6 was informed that they acquired the services of such an
 7 individual. I also suggested to Brigadier Calitz, I said
 8 that these people must remain within the Nyala and that
 9 they should make use of the public address system that is
 10 an accessory to the Nyala to actually communicate with
 11 these people, and we agreed that we will only have a, five
 12 Nyalas at that time that would go and position themselves
 13 close to the area where the people are gathered, and that
 14 they should also explain the presence of the police there,
 15 as well as then the intention that they should get people
 16 that they can start with proper dialogue.

17 MR SEMENYA SC: The afternoon of the 14th,
 18 Brigadier Calitz goes to the koppie with the negotiators.

19 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 20 yes. I can just provide detail in terms of what has
 21 happened prior to that. It was on the morning during the
 22 JOCOM meeting that was chaired at the time by General
 23 Mpembe because I was not there on that Tuesday morning. It
 24 was agreed that there will be, the area will be divided
 25 into four sectors and that resources would be allocated to

1 that four sectors, and that it entailed a high visibility
 2 patrol of the respective areas, and that they should focus
 3 in terms of certain key points that was identified within
 4 the environment, key points that was given by Mr Sinclair
 5 to Colonel Scott in terms of areas that there has been
 6 previous incidents in the build-up, but also on the
 7 transport routes and the bus collection points where the
 8 employees would typically gather and be transported to
 9 their various workstations. In the meantime the planning
 10 team has worked in terms of operationalising the deployment
 11 of the police and at around 13:30 on that afternoon the
 12 commanders were called back to the JOC, whilst the members
 13 remained outside in terms of their deployment, and there
 14 was then a meeting to go and share the approach in terms of
 15 the police in how to deal with the situation. Then after
 16 that is when Brigadier Calitz, when they then deployed,
 17 that is the first time that this monitoring contingent of
 18 the five Nyalas then moved towards the koppie.

19 MR SEMENYA SC: Do you get any feedback
 20 from Brigadier Calitz after they come back from the koppie?

21 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 22 the first feedback we received was feedback over the radio
 23 where he confirmed around 3 000 people that is gathered on
 24 the koppie, and he also indicated that they started with
 25 trying to interact with the protesters and that they

Page 8225

1 approached them and invited any leadership to come forward
 2 to have a discussion with the police, and that later on –
 3 and I do not know the time, but I think maybe around just
 4 before 5 o'clock or so, there was then a group of five
 5 individuals that came forward, that they were initially
 6 very hesitant in terms of coming forward and responding to
 7 the request of the police and that they were given the
 8 assurance that the police just want to have discussions in
 9 terms of finding a resolution to this situation. He also
 10 indicated that after they had communication going, which
 11 was then probably around 5 o'clock, that one of the five
 12 that acted as the spokesperson for this group indicated
 13 that the – I do not know the word, if he used the word -
 14 that their fight or difference is not with the police, but
 15 that it is with the mine management, and Brigadier Calitz
 16 also reported in terms of the death of a person that was
 17 found in close proximity to the koppie, but prior to him
 18 reporting it, I received a call from a Captain Dennis
 19 Adriaio who is from the South African Police Service's
 20 Corporate Communication department, and he was interacting
 21 with the media as a liaison person, and he said that one of
 22 the media journalists reported to him telephonically that
 23 there's a body that was found close to the koppie.

24 [14:13] That information was given through to Brigadier
 25 Calitz as well as the chopper, because it was not certain,

Page 8226

1 we were not certain in terms of exactly what was the
 2 position of that body. A while later, after the report
 3 that I received from Captain Adriaio and after the message
 4 went out on the police radio, the chopper reported that
 5 they have identified a body that is in close proximity to
 6 the copy, and then Brigadier Calitz reported that they
 7 first informed the leadership of that grouping that there
 8 will be police response to that person in terms of the
 9 attendance of that specific crime scene. Members from the
 10 Detective Services and Local Criminal Record Centre then
 11 was despatched to go and assist and they responded to, and
 12 I think they dealt with that crime scene probably at around
 13 19:30. The report was that it was an elderly gentleman
 14 that was lying on his back and he had some stab wounds, as
 15 well as there was animal skull that was placed on his
 16 chest, and then basically Brigadier Calitz and his group,
 17 they returned back to the joint operational centre probably
 18 at half past 8 that evening. I know it was quite late in
 19 terms of coming back after he reported that the biggest
 20 group - het uiteengegaan – they – uiteengegaan?

21 MR HANABE: They dispersed.

22 MR SEMENYA SC: Dispersed.

23 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: They dispersed
 24 a bit earlier, and then he withdrew the deployment of the
 25 police officers to go back to the joint operational centre.

1 MR SEMENYA SC: There is a debriefing
 2 that night. Can you tell us about it?
 3 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Correct. We
 4 had a debriefing upon the return of Brigadier Calitz. We
 5 also withdrew the rest of the people that were deployed in
 6 terms of the crime prevention strategy and high visibility
 7 strategy, and it was after the nightshift members came on
 8 duty, which consisted of Public Order Policing, mostly
 9 Public Order Policing members, so we had a debriefing where
 10 all of the commanders that were deployed came to the joint
 11 operational centre area. The, Brigadier Calitz then
 12 basically gave feedback with his commanders; the
 13 negotiators gave feedback in terms of what has transpired
 14 specifically at the koppie.
 15 MR SEMENYA SC: Was there a discussion
 16 about what was to happen going forward?
 17 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: We confirmed
 18 that we will start the next day with the same deployment.
 19 We've indicated that there will be again a monitoring group
 20 with the negotiators. We indicated that we will add
 21 another forward holding area. On the Tuesday we only had
 22 one forward holding area close to the proximity of a power
 23 station which was in close relation to the koppie. We
 24 indicated that we will have another one in the south-west,
 25 and we indicated that we will then also have then TRT in

1 reserve, as well as then the additional Public Order
 2 Policing, NIU members, Special Task Force members, K9
 3 members, Mounted Unit members, LCRC, Detectives, medical,
 4 fire brigade, all of them in reserve at the forward holding
 5 area with Major-General Naidoo. It was emphasised that we
 6 will continue where we'd left off because the leadership of
 7 that group, when they left they said that they will return
 8 the following day at 9 o'clock as it was getting late, and
 9 that we can then continue in terms of having these
 10 discussions.
 11 MR SEMENYA SC: Now can we pause for a
 12 moment here and talk about what is happening in the JOC in
 13 relation to the plan, the operational plan, so-called the
 14 Scott's plan.
 15 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 16 I'm glad that the advocate is referring to it as the "so-
 17 called Scott's plan." I think I want to place it on record
 18 that it was never Lieutenant-Colonel Scott's plan, that it
 19 was a police plan that was a collective input that we
 20 received from all of our commanders that we had present
 21 there both in terms of having a permanent representative in
 22 the joint operational centre, as well as the input that we
 23 received during the JOCOM meetings. Chairperson, members
 24 of the Commission, I think it's important that we
 25 understand that during these JOCOM meetings we had the,

1 most of the officers, the commanders we had present, so I
 2 would estimate that was probably in the area of about 30
 3 officers that we had present during such JOCOM meetings.
 4 How the process worked is Colonel Scott was
 5 responsible to coordinate the input. He has the advance
 6 knowledge in terms of utilising technology and specifically
 7 in terms of working on the Google program, in terms of
 8 presentations, in terms of collecting and collating the
 9 information, and he was specifically assisted by
 10 Lieutenant-Colonel Merafi. He had the input of Brigadier
 11 Tsiloane both in his capacity as the Public Order Policing
 12 experience, plus then his experience in terms of the
 13 tactical environment, my own input, the input of Brigadier
 14 Fritz, Brigadier Calitz in terms of him being appointed as
 15 an operational commander and his experience as a Public
 16 Order Policing member, but also due to his post as the
 17 provincial commander for Operational Response Services in
 18 the province of North West. Then we had the input of
 19 Colonel Makhubela who has served 32 years in the Public
 20 Order Policing, the input of Colonel Mere, Lieutenant-
 21 Colonel Mere, Lieutenant-Colonel Pitsi, and the guidance of
 22 Major-General Mpembe.
 23 MR SEMENYA SC: Colonel Pitsi has what
 24 background?
 25 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Lieutenant-

1 Colonel Pitsi is the commander of a Public Order Policing
 2 unit and –
 3 MR SEMENYA SC: With what type of
 4 experience?
 5 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 6 it's in excess of 12 years, it's probably closer to 20
 7 years. I'm not too sure in terms of the exact experience.
 8 MR SEMENYA SC: Colonel Mere?
 9 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Colonel Mere
 10 also a unit commander with more or less the same, probably
 11 12, 15 years experience in Public Order Policing. So what
 12 would happen is that Colonel Scott would then collate, he
 13 would get the information. He would, and he developed,
 14 everything he developed was basically in the format of a
 15 PowerPoint presentation. It made it easier so that he can
 16 with an overhead projector display it and portray it, and
 17 then the consolidated input would then be presented to the
 18 JOCOM where discussions would follow and agreements would
 19 be made, and then they will adapt a plan in line with that,
 20 and then ultimately after the collective of the JOCOM would
 21 go and agree to that, then the overall commander would give
 22 his blessing in terms of such an approach.
 23 MR SEMENYA SC: We will come later to
 24 deal with the plan, what it conceived and what risks it
 25 sought to address, a little later.

1 CHAIRPERSON: May I ask, may I intervene.
 2 You said the plan ultimately had to be given the blessing,
 3 I think was the phrase you used, by the overall commander.
 4 Who was the overall commander?
 5 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 6 yes, the approval, ultimate approval would be the overall
 7 commander, Major-General Mpembe.
 8 MR SEMENYA SC: As I say, we'll get back
 9 to that plan a little later. You then chair the joint
 10 operation committee, the JOCOM meeting the morning of the
 11 following day, the 15th.
 12 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That is
 13 correct, Chairperson.
 14 MR SEMENYA SC: Take us through that.
 15 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, on
 16 the Tuesday already, due to the nature and the size of this
 17 operation, Major-General Mpembe requested me to chair the
 18 JOCOM meetings. We also decided to appoint an operational
 19 room commander because the size of the operation was just
 20 such that one person being the overall commander, chairing
 21 the JOCOM meetings, as well as a matter of fact running
 22 then the joint operational centre, it was just too much.
 23 So we've appointed on the Tuesday an operational room
 24 commander, Brigadier Pretorius, and I took the role and
 25 responsibility of chairing the joint operational centre

1 committee meeting.
 2 MR SEMENYA SC: The operational room
 3 commander, Brigadier Pretorius, what was her function?
 4 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, in
 5 such a joint operational centre you will typically have
 6 radio operators who has a responsibility to record the
 7 events. That recording is taking place in a formal
 8 occurrence book, register that the South African Police
 9 Service use, typically the record of personnel deployment,
 10 which we refer to as the SAPS15s, it is a document that you
 11 complete in terms of the people deployed. That would be
 12 completed by the respective commanders of the different
 13 units and then it would be handed in to the joint
 14 operations centre. They will reflect and record the
 15 deployments in terms of personnel numbers. They will
 16 indicate the critical resources that we have in terms of
 17 armoured vehicles. They would put up whiteboards or
 18 flipchart boards so that specific information can be
 19 reflected. You will typically go and summarise the number
 20 of personnel that you have from the various units' call
 21 signs, telephone numbers in terms of various disciplines,
 22 should you need them, put up maps and aerial photographs of
 23 the specific area, perform – I think I can summarise in
 24 terms of performing general administrative duties in terms
 25 of having stationery available, in terms of keeping notes,

1 in terms of arranging the time for the meetings and calling
 2 specific people. If there's assistance required in terms
 3 of getting a detective or whatever the case might be, it
 4 will be centralised through the joint operational centre.
 5 MR SEMENYA SC: The JOCOM meeting you
 6 chaired dealt with an intelligence report as well.
 7 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That is
 8 correct, Chairperson.
 9 MR SEMENYA SC: Who presented that?
 10 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: It was
 11 presented by the, by Brigadier Engelbrecht, who is the
 12 section head, or the head of Crime Intelligence in the
 13 province of North West.
 14 MR SEMENYA SC: Let me digress a little.
 15 What was the scope available for the SAPS in
 16 collecting/collating intelligence around this time?
 17 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, we
 18 would work with your Public Order Policing information
 19 officers and then the Crime Intelligence in terms of
 20 informers network that they have, where they would keep
 21 specific taskings in terms of information that they
 22 acquire. We're also very dependent in terms of the
 23 investigating officers in terms of information that they
 24 get through their normal line of investigation, which would
 25 then be analysed by the Crime Intelligence and presented in

Page 8234

1 a feedback report to the JOCOM.
 2 [14:33] In this instance we also had the small grouping
 3 of Brigadier Fikter in terms of the information that they
 4 collected on the intelligence level.
 5 MR SEMENYA SC: How easy or difficult was
 6 intelligence gathering for the team?
 7 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 8 the feedback that we received from Brigadier Engelbrecht is
 9 that it was extremely difficult, this despite him
 10 committing – I think he had something like nine, or even
 11 more, dedicated Crime Intelligence analysts, personnel from
 12 his office that was dedicated to the Marikana area. Then
 13 we had the added number from the Crime Intelligence group
 14 from Gauteng, and we probably had close to about 30
 15 detectives that were working on the various cases. He
 16 reflected to us that the taskings that he would give to his
 17 informers, that the people indicated that they really are
 18 in fear of their life. He indicated that it's extremely
 19 difficult for them to infiltrate specifically a group of
 20 about 2, 300, the specific grouping that we saw the whole
 21 time separate from the bigger group, and the specific group
 22 which we felt was the core on the Monday also. He
 23 indicated that the group cohesion is such that it's very
 24 difficult for an outsider that's not part of that circle to
 25 actually get into the inner group. It was also difficult

1 because they did not know specifically who these people
 2 are, exactly where they are staying, and that the people
 3 are probably spread over a number of hostels, informal
 4 settlement, and other villages. There was also reference
 5 made to an, during an earlier strike at Implats where there
 6 was a specific informer who was a security guard at the
 7 mine, that this person was used as informer for the police
 8 and that he was found out and he was subsequently killed.
 9 MR SEMENYA SC: Was it somewhat
 10 established how or by whom was the informer killed?
 11 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, I
 12 cannot give you the detail. I did not follow up
 13 necessarily in terms of what was the outcome or the
 14 circumstances around that. It was just in mentioning.
 15 MR SEMENYA SC: The intelligence report
 16 presented at that JOCOM meeting you presided, what
 17 information is relayed in relation to the unions?
 18 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, it
 19 was relayed that the situation in the greater Marikana area
 20 is still very tense. It was indicated that information
 21 suggests that the members from AMCU will not lay down their
 22 weapons, and that they specifically need those weapons to
 23 protect themselves against NUM.
 24 MR SEMENYA SC: In the light of that
 25 report, what was agreed to be the operational plan?

1 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 2 before I get to that, I think I mentioned earlier that
 3 there was an ATM bombing on the Tuesday morning that was
 4 reported during this meeting, because I can recall that I
 5 chaired a meeting, the first meeting I chaired, when it was
 6 brought to my attention. So I think it was rather during
 7 the early hours of that Wednesday morning that there was an
 8 ATM bombing, and that was mentioned in the feedback report
 9 of Brigadier Van Zyl, the Detective Head.
 10 To get back to your question in terms of the
 11 operational concept for the day, it was agreed that we will
 12 continue with the monitoring and negotiation deployment,
 13 indicated that Brigadier Calitz and the negotiators with
 14 the five Nyalas will again go and position themselves where
 15 they were the previous late afternoon. It was also agreed
 16 that there will be a TRT support line about 100 metres
 17 behind this line of the Public Order Policing, and it was
 18 also then agreed, as I've mentioned, that there will be two
 19 forward holding areas, so basically meaning that there will
 20 be two reserve groupings. The one will be at forwarding
 21 holding area 1 under the command of Major-General Naidoo.
 22 The other one was under the command at the time of
 23 Brigadier Whitman, who deployed then on that Wednesday with
 24 a number of members from the Gauteng Public Order Policing
 25 and TRT, but Brigadier Whitman indicated that in all

1 probability he will not be able to be back on the following
 2 and subsequent days, so we had Lieutenant-Colonel Pitsi to
 3 be his assistant so that we can ensure that there would be
 4 consistency in terms of the deployment. Major-General
 5 Naidoo had the bigger reserve group and his position was
 6 probably, I reckon about a kilometre from the koppie area,
 7 whilst the second holding area was a bit further; I reckon
 8 about 1.3 kilometres. Why we decided on two forward
 9 holding areas, that was if you need to respond and you need
 10 to send additional personnel forward to go and assist on
 11 the deployment with Brigadier Calitz, that you can respond
 12 from the, either side, if one of the sides would be
 13 typically cut off.
 14 In Major-General Naidoo's group he had additional
 15 personnel from Public Order Policing, from the National
 16 Intervention Unit and Tactical Response Teams. He also had
 17 K9 handlers and dogs, Mounted Unit, and he the Detective
 18 Team as well as members for the Local Criminal Record
 19 Centre, and he had the assistance from medical personnel,
 20 as well as fire brigade from, arranged through Lonmin. At
 21 the forward holding area 2 we also had Public Order
 22 Policing members, National Intervention Unit, TRT members,
 23 and if I can remember they had a small deployment of K9 and
 24 Special Task Force deployed, apart from their deployment
 25 that they had on the observation post, and the two teams of

1 two people each that they deployed with the monitoring
 2 Nyalas of Brigadier Calitz. They were also at the forward
 3 holding area 1 area.
 4 MR SEMENYA SC: In terms of area
 5 reconnaissance, what was available to you?
 6 MR HANABE: In terms of?
 7 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Aerial.
 8 CHAIRPERSON: Aerial reconnaissance. In
 9 terms of aerial reconnaissance, what was available to you?
 10 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, we
 11 had two South African Police Service helicopters available.
 12 The one was a, known as a squirrel helicopter. It is a
 13 helicopter – with my limited knowledge about the industry -
 14 of a pilot, as well as then a, what we refer to as LEO,
 15 assistant law enforcement officer, with the carrying
 16 capacity for three passengers.
 17 Then we had an R44, Robinson R44 chopper, and I
 18 think the total carrying capacity of that is probably just
 19 the two people. Over and above to that we had the support
 20 of an Oryx helicopter from the South African Air Force. We
 21 had that specifically there because of its carrying
 22 capacity so that we could have either Special Task Force or
 23 National Intervention Unit members that we can deploy if
 24 there would be any wayward incidents that would come to our
 25 attention, that they can take those people there and then

Page 8239

1 go and deploy them in the specific area so they can attend
 2 to such an incident.
 3 Then even although it was not any of our assets,
 4 there was a Protea Coin, a Mr De Waal from Protea Coin. He
 5 approached us during that, I think that Wednesday,
 6 somewhere during the day, and he'd indicated that we should
 7 be aware that he has a chopper that is flying on the
 8 perimeter area, focussing on specific key points within the
 9 Lonmin Mine area as part of their security deployment
 10 contract that they have with the mine. He wanted us to be
 11 aware of that additional chopper that would be in the air,
 12 and he also made available, he said should we have the
 13 need, that we can also utilise the second chopper that
 14 Protea Coin has when it's available, because all of the
 15 choppers use the same landing site. Chairperson, which was
 16 just outside of the JOC area, there was an open area where
 17 a lot of the vehicles parked, and then adjacent to that
 18 where the choppers would typically land.
 19 Chairperson, then the use of the two police
 20 choppers, we had that for aerial surveillance and providing
 21 information back to the joint operational centre, also in
 22 terms of a specific command post for wayward incidents if
 23 we have to then move away from the area of responsibility
 24 where typically Brigadier Calitz would operate in, and then
 25 to guide Brigadier Calitz and the members in terms of

1 typically being eye-in-the-sky so they can relay that
 2 information.
 3 MR SEMENYA SC: Would this, Chair, be a
 4 convenient stage for the tea adjournment?
 5 CHAIRPERSON: Very well. The Commission
 6 will take the tea adjournment. We'll try to resume at
 7 about 5 past 3.
 8 [COMMISSION ADJOURNS COMMISSION RESUMES]
 9 [15:10] CHAIRPERSON: The Commission resumes.
 10 Major-General, you're still under oath.
 11 CHARL ANNANDALE: s.u.o.
 12 CHAIRPERSON: Mr Semenya, would you like
 13 to ask the witness some more questions?
 14 EXAMINATION BY MR SEMENYA SC (CONTD.):
 15 Indeed, Chair. General, we have just finished discussing
 16 the salient features of the operational concept for the day
 17 of the 15th. Correct?
 18 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That is
 19 correct, Chairperson.
 20 MR SEMENYA SC: Primary in that would
 21 have been also the continued negotiations.
 22 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That is
 23 correct, Chairperson.
 24 MR SEMENYA SC: Are the protesters
 25 contacted again who were at the koppie?

1 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, on
 2 the Wednesday the 15th after the morning JOCOM meeting,
 3 Brigadier Calitz and their monitoring contingent, as well
 4 as the rest of the deployment went back to their respective
 5 positions, as I've highlighted during the agreed planning.
 6 That was just prior to 10 o'clock in the morning. They
 7 were then, they resumed dialogue with the same five men as
 8 per the previous day. The spokesperson of the five men was
 9 an individual dressed in a, or he had a type of a green
 10 blanket; he's now known as Mr Noki. In these negotiations
 11 that resumed, Mr Noki insisted that they want to speak to
 12 the mine management.
 13 Brigadier Calitz further reported back to the JOC
 14 that the negotiation team tried to convince this group to
 15 lay down their weapons. In this attempt that they made to
 16 convince them to lay down their weapons, it was indicated
 17 that this group of five became agitated and this in turn
 18 then sort of led to the rest of the group also to become
 19 more – the word probably, I do not want to use the word
 20 "aggressive," but also agitated, and they, or he reported
 21 that it then became difficult to continue negotiation.
 22 There was then a break in negotiation.
 23 MR SEMENYA SC: We know that that effort
 24 was not successful to get the protesters to disarm.
 25 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That is

1 correct, Chairperson.
 2 MR SEMENYA SC: Is there any contact that
 3 gets made between General Mpembe and the union
 4 representatives?
 5 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Advocate, did
 6 you say the unit representatives?
 7 MR SEMENYA SC: President –
 8 CHAIRPERSON: Union. Die vakbond se
 9 verteenwoordigers.
 10 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Union. Before
 11 I get to that, if I can just mention that it was also
 12 reported earlier that the leader element of that group
 13 indicated that they have an Adv Shapiro and that Adv
 14 Shapiro would want to speak to the overall commander, or
 15 somebody in command of the police. That was relayed to the
 16 JOC by Brigadier Calitz and we provided Brigadier Calitz
 17 with a landline telephone number of the joint operational
 18 centre and said that he should give this through them and
 19 relay it to the advocate so that he can speak to the
 20 commander. It was reported, and I do not know the time,
 21 that there was a specific threat made by Mr Noki to the
 22 negotiators through the negotiation that "People in hippos
 23 will die here today."
 24 Coming to General Mpembe, I know that on that
 25 afternoon at around 14:00 he met with mine management and

1 also with the presidents of AMCU as well as NUM, which was
 2 arranged on the insistence of General Mpembe in terms of
 3 previous interactions he had with, I think the labour
 4 representative or somebody from the Lonmin Mine on the
 5 Tuesday, as well as the Wednesday, where he requested that
 6 they should make such arrangements.
 7 MR SEMENYA SC: What was the purpose of
 8 meeting these presidents?
 9 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: It was
 10 consistently reported that, basically that AMCU says that
 11 it's not our members, and NUM said it's not necessarily our
 12 members, that NUM would say that there's some of their
 13 people that have gone over to AMCU although they're still
 14 card bearers of the NUM, and General Mpembe insisted that
 15 the only way that we will be able to resolve that is to
 16 have, set up a meeting with the highest authority in both
 17 those unions. He wanted to meet with them to see if they
 18 can then intervene in terms of reaching out to their
 19 members and then to get them to a peaceful resolution in
 20 terms of laying down their weapons, and he's requested
 21 Lonmin Mine to facilitate such a meeting. As indicated,
 22 around 2 o'clock he then went to such a meeting where they
 23 were both available and present, and then after the meeting
 24 he came out and he said that there's an agreement that both
 25 of these presidents are willing to go and meet with the

1 people at the koppie. He requested me to make arrangements
 2 that these people would be taken to the koppie by police
 3 vehicles, as he indicated that the arrangement that was
 4 made on his request that they would go and that they
 5 volunteered after much convincing and discussions to go
 6 there. He indicated that it was agreed that the respective
 7 presidents plus two of their representatives each would go
 8 to the koppie.
 9 I then arranged that we have two separate police
 10 vehicles, minibuses available, because the two union
 11 presidents and the delegation said that they are not
 12 travelling together. The president of NUM specifically was
 13 concerned about his safety. They asked if he can take more
 14 people along in his delegation and if he can take
 15 specifically some of his, I take it close protectors or
 16 people responsible for his safety, to go along. I
 17 indicated to him that we will take the responsibility in
 18 terms of their safety by delegating then the Special Task
 19 Force members to actually escort them and take them there,
 20 and I had then Special Task Force members in both vehicles.
 21 The groups left to the forward holding area
 22 because the agreement was they will go to the forward
 23 holding area of Major-General Naidoo. I, if I can
 24 remember, General Mpembe and I think a, it's a Mr Kgwadi,
 25 Kgwadi from Lonmin, is the person that is responsible for

Page 8245

1 their labour, he's the labour representative, was his
 2 responsibility. They went along, and there was a Mr Kgotle
 3 from Lonmin that stayed behind. Then they left and went to
 4 the forward holding area and feedback indicated that around
 5 quarter past 5, 17:15 on that day, it was first the NUM
 6 delegation that was taken forward to go to the command
 7 Nyala of Brigadier Calitz, and that their president had an
 8 opportunity to address the members. Even though General
 9 Mpembe during the discussions he had in the meeting made it
 10 clear in terms of what the references would be in terms of
 11 their approach and their discussion when they address their
 12 members, it was reiterated before their departure that they
 13 have agreed that they will talk only to their members on
 14 matters of security in terms of their laying down their
 15 arms, and that there will be no other discussion in terms
 16 of labour related issues.
 17 MR SEMENYA SC: Time allocation?
 18 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: It was also
 19 agreed that they, both groups will get 20 minutes to
 20 address their members. Chairperson, it was a difficult
 21 process to get there in terms of what's the number of the
 22 delegations, who will go first, who will go second, what
 23 will be the time allocated, so that took us a while. In
 24 the end we decided on that 20 minutes because it was
 25 getting late, because it started earlier than that and it

Page 8246

1 took us a while to get the two presidents to agree amongst
 2 themselves, without wanting to talk directly to one
 3 another. So we had to act as intermediaries again. Then
 4 about half an hour after the president of NUM and his
 5 delegation returned from the koppie; the AMCU president
 6 with his delegation then went forward to the koppie.
 7 MR SEMENYA SC: Before you say that, was
 8 it evident what the reasons were why the two presidents
 9 would not speak to each other?
 10 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, it
 11 was difficult. It was just blatantly said that there is no
 12 trust and it was said that "We will go first, we will not
 13 travel in the vehicle." So there was no reasons advanced
 14 specifically why; it was just said that "We are not
 15 travelling, we do not want to be seen with one another."
 16 MR SEMENYA SC: Was the gravity of the
 17 situation apparent to both of them?
 18 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 19 yes, the groups were separate, so the NUM president with
 20 his delegation - which was a bigger delegation than the two
 21 - was standing on one side, and then a distance away, that
 22 was now in the general area of the JOC, the others were,
 23 but both of them were aware and both of them individually
 24 to the police gave their commitment that they understand
 25 that and they understand their responsibility.

1 MR SEMENYA SC: Which particular group
 2 then goes first to the koppie?
 3 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 4 that was the NUM group, and on the radio it was reported
 5 back by Brigadier Calitz that the president when he
 6 addressed the crowd on the public address system of the
 7 Nyala, that he was jeered and that he really did not have
 8 an opportunity to actually try to get his message across,
 9 even although there was such an attempt made.
 10 MR SEMENYA SC: And in relation to the
 11 president of AMCU and his attempt at speaking to the
 12 protesters at the koppie?
 13 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson, as
 14 I've mentioned, he went about an half an hour after the NUM
 15 delegation. It was reported back to the JOC that he was
 16 welcomed by the bigger group.
 17 MR SEMENYA SC: Does he achieve the goal
 18 of having some of those members disarm?
 19 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 20 no.
 21 MR SEMENYA SC: You later as police
 22 officials then meet separately with the union leaders.
 23 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Chairperson,
 24 that's correct, yes, at around, probably around 19:30 - it
 25 was already dark – we then met. We met at a facility in

1 the bigger area of the joint operational centre. We had
 2 present myself, General Naidoo and General Mpembe – General
 3 Mpembe basically requested General Naidoo and myself to be
 4 present. I can remember we had Mr Kwadi again, Kgwadi, as
 5 well as Mr Kgotle from Lonmin, and then we had a big
 6 delegation of NUM. Again the groupings did not want to sit
 7 down together in terms of providing this feedback, or
 8 having this debriefing with us, so we met first with NUM
 9 and the bigger delegation, and Mr Kgwadi facilitated. The
 10 president of NUM gave his feedback in terms of how they
 11 were received at the koppie, and he indicated that he was
 12 not welcomed, that the people did not allow him to talk,
 13 and that that was indicative to him that, or indicative to
 14 him that these are not his members. He, however, said that
 15 he's appealing to the police to maintain a high presence
 16 within the area. He said that their own members, the NUM
 17 members, that they are in fear of their life, and he gave
 18 his commitment that they will assist in any way they can in
 19 terms of information and intelligence, and he indicated
 20 that they condone, as a NUM leadership they condone
 21 violence.
 22 [15:30] MR SEMENYA SC: Condemn, not condone.
 23 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Condemn.
 24 CHAIRPERSON: You mean condemn –
 25 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That's a huge

1 difference. Even I as an Afrikaans-speaking individual
 2 know that.
 3 VOORSITTER: Dit kan ek nie verstaan nie
 4 – kondoneer in Afrikaans beteken nie – jy weet –
 5 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That was
 6 basically the crux of the meeting with the NUM delegation.
 7 Then we met with the president of AMCU and also a sizeable
 8 delegation, and feedback was given. I know General Mpembe,
 9 and I'm not aware of the contents of the actual discussion,
 10 or what was conveyed by the president of AMCU, but I know
 11 General Mpembe said that that was not as part of the
 12 agreement in terms of the message that you brought across.
 13 The president of AMCU, he said then that despite the
 14 general perception that exists in the media, that AMCU as a
 15 leadership also condemns violence, and that they've
 16 indicated their willingness to assist also in terms of to
 17 assist the police to find a peaceful resolution to this
 18 whole process.
 19 The president, Mr Mathunjwa, then said that he is
 20 convinced that on the following day at 9 o'clock, that his
 21 members, or that group – he did not say his members - that
 22 that group will lay down their weapons. He said that it
 23 was agreed because of the late hour that they will convene
 24 again and that they will meet again at 9 o'clock on the
 25 Thursday. He indicated that he's so convinced that they

1 will lay down their weapons, that he's asked for the police
 2 that we should arrange that the people be allowed to spend
 3 their last night at the koppie, and he said that he's
 4 requesting the police not to harass the people – the word
 5 that he used. I indicated to him that as the South African
 6 Police Service we do not harass people, but what we will do
 7 is to get our nightshift deployment that they keep a fair
 8 distance from the koppie, that it's not perceived that the
 9 people would be harassed.
 10 I then went into more detail and I said, so Mr
 11 Mathunjwa, how will we practically do this disarmament, or
 12 disarming, and I proposed, I said the police will form a
 13 line and that the people as they then leave, that they
 14 leave through this area and that they will just lay down
 15 their, the weapons that they have as they walk through, and
 16 he said, "General, no, people will never do that," because
 17 he said he will probably, they will be, it will be seen
 18 that the police will probably take photographs and be able
 19 to identify them for potential arrests. He then made the
 20 proposal and he indicated that the people, as they are
 21 seated on the koppie and the immediate surroundings, that
 22 they will just then leave the weapons there where they are
 23 seated and that they will just disperse and leave, and I
 24 indicated that we will be comfortable with that. He
 25 remarked that we will all be smiling, I think the word that

 8 the debriefing that happens end of that day?

 12 commanders started with the debriefing. I think it was
 13 probably chaired by either Brigadier Pretorius or Brigadier
 14 Calitz in terms of getting that feedback, so the detail in
 15 terms of that feedback, we were not present, but when we
 16 joined, we gave them detailed feedback in terms of the
 17 meetings that we just had. We shared with our commanders
 18 that we had a constructive meeting, that we had the
 19 commitment from both unions that they denounce violence,
 20 that it was conducted in a real good spirit, and that we
 21 feel confident that tomorrow at 9 o'clock when the
 22 president of AMCU will meet again with the people at the
 23 koppie, that there will be a laying down of weapons. We
 24 indicated that we will then re-gather again the next
 25 morning at 6 o'clock and that we will have the same

 2 terms of the continuation with the monitoring, as well as
 3 then should there be any further negotiations necessary.
 4 Brigadier Whitman also indicated that he himself and two of
 5 his commanders will not be available for the Thursday due

 7 to attend to, planned ones, but he indicated that he will
 8 send the maximum personnel that he has both in terms of
 9 Public Order Policing and TRT, and the rest of the
 10 deployment was the same people that would return the next
 11 day.
 12 MR SEMENYA SC: Now before we discuss the
 13 events of the 16th, can we just touch on the plan that went
 14 and got designed for the 16th, and perhaps –
 15 CHAIRPERSON: I'm sorry, Mr Semenya, but
 16 you've asked something that I'm not quite sure it fits in
 17 with what we know so far - it may do, but I just want to
 18 clarify. Mr Semenya talks about the plan that was designed
 19 for the 16th. So was it decided that the operational plan
 20 was going to be implemented on the 16th, or was the decision
 21 taken that the plan, such as it was, will be implemented on
 22 the 16th, was that decision made later? You know you could
 23 have a plan in place; the exact time and date when it's
 24 going to be executed could stand over. Alternatively you
 25 could have already agreed that come what may, that the plan

 12 Thank you, Sir.
 13 MR SEMENYA SC: Yes, so if all went
 14 according to plan, the operation would have been handled,
 15 as the documents tell us, exhibit SS3 – can I invite you to
 16 go there? Do you recognise that document?
 17 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: I do indeed,
 18 yes, Chairperson.
 19 MR SEMENYA SC: It is dated the 10th of
 20 August 2012. This is some days before you arrive at
 21 Marikana. Correct?

 25 action, example bomb threat, attack, and etcetera." Fourth

 8 paragraph 5.2.2, "Must liaise with intelligence community
 9 regarding all available intelligence and provided to the

 11 planning purposes."
 12 MR SEMENYA SC: The responsibilities of
 13 the Public Order Police?
 14 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: It indicates
 15 under paragraph 5.2.4, "Two officers and 12 members will be
 16 responsible to do the following." First bullet, "To do
 17 crowd management in terms of the national policy on crowd
 18 management;" second bullet, "To record all incidents and
 19 casualties as they occur;" third bullet, "To post a record
 20 clerk at the JOC."
 21 MR SEMENYA SC: In terms of
 22 implementation, what was conceived under paragraph 5.3?
 23 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Under
 24 subparagraph 1, "The operational concept," first bullet,
 25 "To keep ready to immediately arrest perpetrators for any

1 crime committed within section line;" sub-bullet 2, "To
 2 keep ready to immediately isolate any place before, during,
 3 and after the strike when information received about any
 4 risk, with one section in line;" bullet 3, "To patrol" –

 7 CHAIRPERSON: Mr Semenya wanted to – yes,
 8 carry on.
 9 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: I'll repeat
 10 that, "To patrol the area with one section in line on a 24-
 11 hour basis," and then the last bullet, "Hour of beginning
 12 of OPS on command on 2012-08-10."
 13 MR SEMENYA SC: It also deals with
 14 coordination instructions, but more importantly, what does
 15 it tell us about the use of force?
 16 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: Paragraph 7
 17 under the heading "Use of force," it reads, "Only on
 18 command or self-defence."
 19 MR SEMENYA SC: And it itemises various
 20 equipment that was to be used, but deals with special
 21 instructions under paragraph 9.
 22 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: That is
 23 correct, yes, Chairperson.
 24 MR SEMENYA SC: What does it tell us
 25 under special instructions?

1 MAJOR-GENERAL ANNANDALE: It indicates
 2 under bullet, the first bullet, "If problems are
 3 experienced with channel 77 and channel 65 as an emergency
 4 channel;" second bullet, "When the order is given to

 7 situation, it must be done as soon as possible in order to
